FLEXIBLE STUDY TO FIT YOUR LIFESTYLE



Study needs to be flexible. We understand that life changes fast and it's essential for students to find the right balance of work, life and study.

Study part time or full time

Many courses offer part-time and full-time study options, as well as allowing you to switch between part-time and full-time study throughout your degree to suit your personal situation. This means if things change, you're not locked into a mode that no longer suits you.

Study over three trimesters

We have three study periods during the teaching year. This gives you more choice about when to start your degree and can even enable you to fast-track your study by taking extra units throughout the year. Some students take a trimester off to work or travel, then catch up later.

Our study periods are Trimester 1 (March to June), Trimester 2 (July to October) and Trimester 3 (November to February). Studying in Trimester 3 is not compulsory and not all courses offer units during this time. For information, visit deakin.edu.au/study-at-deakin/important-dates.

Study online or on campus

You can study at our Melbourne, Geelong or Warrnambool campuses or online via the Cloud Campus. Deakin offers courses both fully and partly online, allowing you to balance life's other priorities with your studies. WHAT IS THE TIME COMMITMENT OF POSTGRADUATE STUDY?

For the average postgraduate coursework unit expect three contact hours per week, plus up to seven hours of independent study per unit. This is a guide, contact hours will vary depending on the course and campus of study.

POSTGRADUATE STUDY PATHWAYS



COURSEWORK OR RESEARCH?

POSTGRADUATE COURSEWORK

- Courses are generally six months to two years full time.
- Expect set assessments, projects and classes, just like an undergraduate degree.
- Ideal for advancing your career or developing new skills.
- Usually requires the completion of an undergraduate degree.

POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH

- Courses are generally two to four years full time.
- Expect independent research and investigation of original ideas in an approved research program under the guidance of a supervisor.
- Ideal for making a new contribution to an academic field.
- Usually requires an undergraduate degree with honours or a master's degree.

In general, postgraduate study falls into two broad categories – coursework and research.

Research degree pathways

To enrol in a research degree you usually need to have completed an undergraduate degree with honours or a master's degree with a substantial research component. Other qualifications may be accepted if the relevant faculty or school considers them equivalent and you can demonstrate evidence of your research ability.

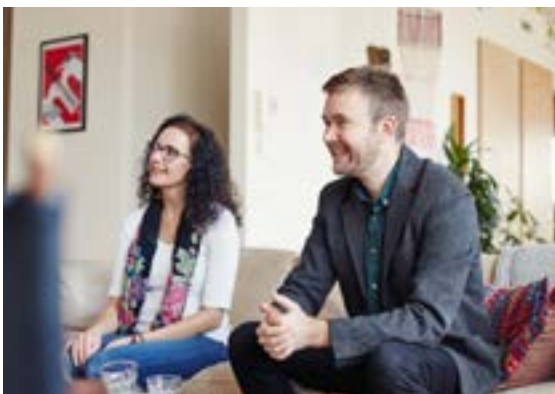
Coursework degree pathways

To enrol in a coursework degree you usually need to have completed an undergraduate degree first. Although traditionally students complete an undergraduate degree before postgraduate study, in some cases you may be able to use your extensive professional experience to apply directly for a postgraduate coursework degree at Deakin, without having completed an undergraduate course.

The tiered nature of the graduate certificate, graduate diploma and master's degree may allow you to gain entry using a lower qualification as a stepping stone. If you're thinking about a master's but don't initially qualify, you may be accepted into the graduate certificate or diploma in the same area of study.

The three tiers mean that you also have the flexibility to choose your time commitment and level of course depth. If you choose to study a master's degree but your circumstances change, you may be able to exit the degree early with the relevant graduate certificate or graduate diploma.

Credit for prior study or professional experience

Prior study or professional experience may be counted towards your Deakin degree, saving you time and money, as well as expanding your education choices.

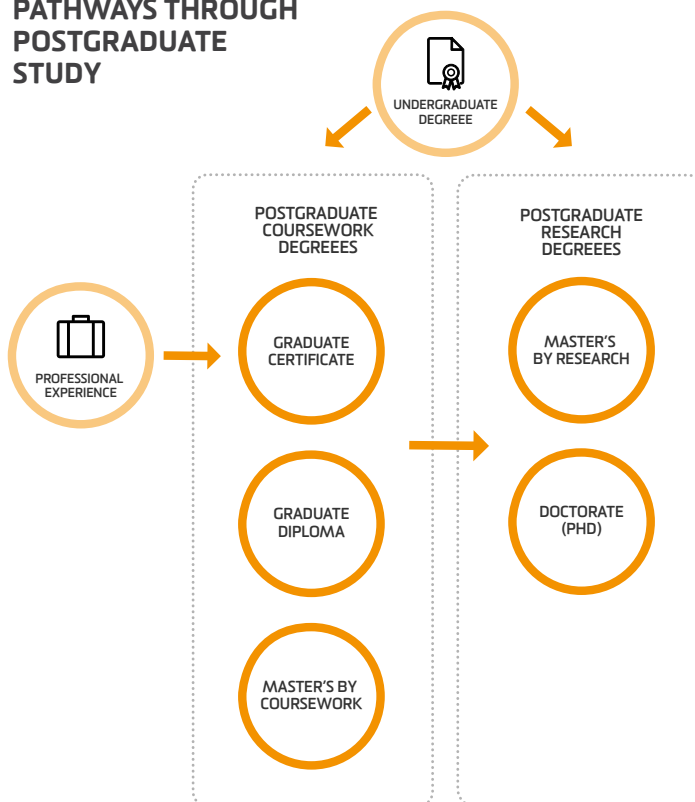
There are two aspects to credit transfer and recognition:

- credit may be granted on the basis of knowledge and skills acquired through experience, such as in the workplace.

PATHWAYS THROUGH POSTGRADUATE STUDY



COURSEWORK STUDY

A coursework program is perfect if you want to advance your career, or meet a professional requirement.

Coursework at Deakin offers multiple study options with different time commitments. The graduate certificate, graduate diploma and master's degree are connected and can build on each other. For example, you could complete a Graduate Certificate of Communication in six months, a Graduate Diploma of Communication by continuing to study for one year, or a Master of Communication by continuing to study for two years.



Graduate certificate

Develop skills in a specialised field that might not directly relate to your undergraduate degree. Graduate certificates can sometimes be used as a direct pathway to further postgraduate study.

Graduate diploma

Specialise and focus on a vocation with a graduate diploma. You usually need to have completed a bachelor's degree or equivalent. You can also gain entry with professional or industry experience, or other relevant approved qualifications.

Master's degree by coursework

Designed to cater to professionals, these courses have the added benefit of providing an environment for networking with like-minded people.

Deakin offers the Master of Science, which, through a unique combination of coursework and research, provides an ideal pathway between undergraduate study and a doctoral degree.

Professional practice

Deakin offers a professional practice credentialing service that can be completed online. This service independently measures your professional skills and abilities, recognising the work experience you have accumulated without formal university credentials.

As part of the process you provide evidence of your capabilities and are then interviewed by an expert panel from your industry. If you're successful you'll be awarded a Deakin professional practice credential. To find out more, visit deakindigital.com.

THE BENEFITS OF AN HONOURS DEGREE

If you did not complete an honours year as an undergraduate, there are many benefits of doing so. Honours is a specialised year of study enabling you to develop an in-depth understanding of a particular discipline through research, allowing you to focus on what you're really passionate about.

Consider an honours year if you value intellectual challenge and independent thinking, plus it's a pathway to postgraduate research degrees and increased career opportunities.

At Deakin you gain honours in one of two ways:

In-course honours award

This type of honours award recognises outstanding achievement in a bachelor's degree program of four or more years, which has an embedded honours component.

Research-based honours award

This type of honours award allows you to undertake specialised research and research training on a course that allows an additional year of study.



DEAKIN HALLMARKS

Deakin Hallmarks are awards that recognise students' outstanding achievement of Graduate Learning Outcomes – skills that are key to employability and prized by professionals. RESEARCH STUDY

Research degrees encourage you to develop independent research skills and enable you to pursue your own ideas.

Postgraduate research is a pathway to a research or academic career, as well as a career in the workplace.

We are proud to be able to provide our research students with access to world-class facilities, a network of academic supervisors who are leaders in their fields and a large range of research disciplines. Our strong commitment to research can be seen in our excellent performance in the Australian Research Council's Excellence in Research for Australia (ERA) rankings. We offer different types of research degrees to match your career plans and personal circumstances.

Master's degree by research

Awarded for an original contribution to knowledge achieved in up to two years of full-time candidature, or two to four years of part-time study.

Doctor of Philosophy (PhD)

Awarded for a substantial original contribution to knowledge achieved in three to four years of full-time, or six to eight years of part-time study.

Doctor of Psychology

Combines coursework (theory), a research project and professional practice. We offer Doctor of Psychology degrees in the areas of both clinical and health psychology.



LEADING FACILITIES

Deakin's campuses boast leading facilities, with Geelong Wairn Ponds Campus home to the newly built Centre for Advanced Design in Engineering Training (CADET)*, providing some of the best future-focused engineering and design facilities in Australian universities. Also at Wairn Ponds, the Australian Future Fibres Research and Innovation Centre (AFFRIC) features the world's first research facility for carbon fibre innovation, capable of producing commercial quantities of aerospace-quality carbon fibre.

FUNDING YOUR POSTGRADUATE STUDY



There are many options to help you manage the cost of study, which are matched by the rewards of career advancement, higher salaries and greater job satisfaction.

What is the postgraduate course fee?

Tuition fees are based on the course you enrol in. You can find course, unit and fee information using the course search tool at deakin.edu.au/study-at-deakin/find-a-course.

There are two types of fees: Fee-Paying Place and Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP).

Fee-Paying Place

Fee-paying place is a place that is not subsidised by the Government, so you pay the full cost of the course. As a domestic fee-paying student you may be eligible to defer payment of your fees through the Australian taxation system's FEE-HELP loan program. Your employer may also consider assisting with the cost of study if the course is related to your current position. Annual course fees for FPPs in 2017 are based on the course fee and annual study load, regardless of your unit selection.

Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP)

Some postgraduate courses at Deakin offer CSP, where the Government pays a proportion of tuition costs. CSP fees are indicative because they are calculated based on your unit selection. Indicative CSP course fees for 2017 will be available in late 2016 – please visit deakin.edu.au/study-at-deakin/find-a-course for the most up-to-date information.

Deferring fee payment

FEE-HELP is a government loan program that helps you defer all or part of your tuition fees – for full fee-paying places. The fee is indexed annually to maintain its real value in line with changes to the cost of living as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

If you are enrolled in a CSP you may be eligible to defer all or part of your tuition fees through HECS-HELP – the Higher Education Contribution Scheme-Higher Education Loan Program.


When do I start repaying my loan?

You repay your loan through the Australian taxation system once your income is above the minimum threshold for compulsory repayment (2016/17 threshold is \$54 869). FEE-HELP debts are added to any existing HELP debts to form a single HELP debt with the Commonwealth.

AM I ELIGIBLE FOR FEE-HELP?

You are eligible for FEE-HELP assistance if you:

- are enrolled in a fee-paying postgraduate coursework program (not research)
- are not a Commonwealth supported student
- are an Australian citizen who will undertake at least one unit of study contributing to your course of study, while living in Australia, the holder of a permanent humanitarian visa, or an eligible New Zealander who is resident in Australia for the duration of your unit
- meet the Tax File Number (TFN) requirements
- have not exceeded the maximum indexed FEE-HELP limit amount.



DO I PAY FEES FOR A RESEARCH DEGREE?

If you're an Australian citizen, Australian permanent resident or a New Zealand citizen you don't pay any tuition fees for the normal duration of your research degree candidature, i.e. up to a maximum of four years of full-time equivalent study for a doctoral candidate and two years of full-time equivalent study for a master's candidate.

For 2016, the FEE-HELP limit is \$99 389 for most students. For students undertaking medicine, dentistry and veterinary science courses (as defined in the Higher Education Support Act 2003) the FEE-HELP limit is \$124 238.

HELP repayments are made through the online taxation system once your annual income reaches the minimum threshold for repayment. Alternatively, eligible students may pay their contribution upfront.

Applying for a scholarship

We offer scholarships to help support you financially during your studies. Information about scholarships at Deakin is available at deakin.edu.au/study-at-deakin/scholarships-and-awards.

You can also visit the Study Assist website www.studyassist.gov.au for links to a range of scholarships relevant to postgraduate study, including Australian postgraduate awards. Many industry and community scholarships are also available.

Obtaining student income support

If you're undertaking a professionally oriented coursework master's degree that is required for entry to a profession or is the fastest pathway to professional entry, you may be eligible for student income support. For more information, visit deakin.edu.au/study-at-deakin/fees.

Making the most of tax benefits

When you enrol in a postgraduate course you may be entitled to an income tax deduction for your course fees and study-related expenses. You may be able to claim for your course fees, textbooks, stationery, student association fees and depreciation on equipment, for example your computer, or some of your travel expenses between home and university or between work and university.

Cost-sharing with employers

Some employers offer financial and other support, such as study leave, for staff members who are completing study that is directly related to their employment and the employer's core business. At Deakin, many people are studying a postgraduate course with their employer's help.

Give your employer a written submission outlining the benefits and review the direct and indirect costs involved.

The submission could include information about:

- the course you wish to study
- any tax deductible aspects of the program

- a summary of the short-term and long-term benefits that would flow to you and your employer
- an estimate of the total course costs of fees, textbooks and other materials
- an estimate of the time you would be required to be away from work in order to attend classes and exams, prepare reports and so on
- what assistance you are requesting for aspects, such as sharing of costs and granting of time off work.

Study resources

Library

Each campus library has spaces where you can study, meet friends, borrow items and connect to Deakin's wireless network. The library's collection contains more than 1.5 million items, including books and e-books, journals, streaming videos, DVDs and library databases.

Many of the library's resources are also available online, so you can access them anywhere, anytime via your computer, phone or other devices. If you are studying via Deakin's Cloud Campus you can request resources online and have them delivered to your home free of charge.

Ultramodern facilities include the professional motion capture lab, dance, drama and television studios, food and nutrition labs and IT gaming facilities. The campus is also home to the Deakin University Art Gallery.

Burwood residences

The Melbourne Burwood Campus has campus-based accommodation available for more than 1100 students year-round with 24-hour, seven-day-a-week staff and security support.

The brand new and existing multi-storey apartment complexes have accommodation for more than 900 students in either self-contained studio apartments, or private bedrooms within two-, four-, five- or six-bedroom apartments, with shared bathrooms, kitchens and lounge areas.

Our 10-bedroom units can accommodate up to 200 students between them, featuring private bedrooms, shared bathrooms, kitchen and lounge areas, with single units available from 2017.

The residences also incorporate landscaped courtyards, BBQ areas, study rooms on each floor, two large ground floor recreational spaces, multiple modern, stylish common areas for social activities, games area, central laundries, secure bike storage, movie room and computer lab. Geelong Waterfront Campus

With its striking heritage architectural features and view over Corio Bay, the Geelong Waterfront Campus is spectacular.

Originally utilised as wool stores between 1893 and 1940, the extensively renovated buildings are now ideal for Deakin's huge purpose-built architecture and creative arts studios, moot law court, nursing education facilities and occupational therapy lab.

Waterfront students love the central location, creative, modern areas to catch up or study, and free shuttle bus to the Geelong Wauran Ponds Campus.

Geelong Waterfront residences

Studio apartments are available in the iconic T&G Building, a short walk from the Geelong Waterfront Campus. The building also features a central common area with kitchen/dining zones, laundry facility, outdoor BBQ area and a shared study area.

Extensive campus accommodation at the Geelong Wauran Ponds Campus is available to students studying at Geelong Waterfront.

Geelong Wauran Ponds Campus

Just 10 km from the Geelong CBD is the Geelong Wauran Ponds Campus. The campus is home to some of Deakin's most cutting-edge facilities including Carbon Nexus, Centre for Advanced Design in Engineering Training (CADET), a partnership between Deakin and the Australian Government, Deakin Medical School and the Deakin Regional Community Health Hub. There's also a brand new student residences precinct with accommodation for about 800 students, as well as a new elite sports precinct.

All this is set amongst expansive, landscaped grounds that encourage students to make the most of the outdoor space.

Wauran Ponds students love being close to the Torquay surf coast and the Great Ocean Road and enjoy easy access to the Wauran Ponds train station.



Geelong Waurm Ponds residences

The Geelong Waurm Ponds Campus has campus-based accommodation available for 800 students. The shared accommodation units and dormitories house 475 students in 50 units, with unit sizes ranging from two to 29 bedrooms. Units feature communal kitchens, bathrooms and lounge areas, and central laundry facilities are also available. Units are mixed gender and multicultural.

A newly built complex comprising 309 self-contained studio apartments provides accommodation for low-income students. The complex features communal indoor and outdoor patio areas, a large kitchen and lounge, and a central laundry facility.

Medical accommodation precinct

These Geelong residences provide 10 fully self-contained individual modular units, each housing three people, plus seven two-bedroom townhouses each with ensuite bathrooms.

Warrnambool Campus

Set on the banks of the picturesque Hopkins River, Warrnambool offers comfortable living and a cultural scene hosted by a great regional gallery and arts centre. Warrnambool has plenty of options for an active student, and the small town feel creates a sense of community that can be harder to find in a big city.

The Warrnambool Campus is a close-knit community, a place where students and lecturers really have the opportunity to get to know each other and work closely together.

Being located near a number of unique aquatic environments makes the Warrnambool Campus an ideal location for marine biology studies.

Warrnambool residences

The Warrnambool Campus has campus-based accommodation available for 342 students. There is accommodation for 240 students in a mixed gender and multicultural environment, with unit sizes ranging from four to 21 bedrooms. All units have communal kitchens, bathrooms, lounge areas and laundries.

There are also 102 modern, self-contained single rooms, each with a kitchenette, bathroom and bed/living space. All residences feature communal indoor and outdoor patio areas, a large kitchen and lounge, and a central laundry facility.



APPLYING TO DEAKIN



Once you've chosen a course, submitting an application to study at Deakin is easy.

How can I apply?

You can apply to start most postgraduate courses in Trimester 1, 2 or 3 through Deakin's Course Application Portal at deakin.edu.au/apply. Always check admission guidelines, as some courses have different application processes. We encourage you to submit your application early because some courses have limited places or quotas.

DON'T FORGET TO APPLY FOR CREDIT FOR PRIOR LEARNING

Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) is the recognition of previous study, professional or volunteer experience completed. If approved, it can reduce the number of units you need to study at Deakin, allowing you to complete your course earlier. Visit deakin.edu.au/cpl for more information.

COURSEWORK APPLICATION PROCESS

Step 1

Prepare

Check your course-specific entry requirements at deakin.edu.au/course. Prepare the documents and information required for the application.

Step 2

Get started

Start your online application by registering as a user at deakin.edu.au/study-at-deakin/apply.

Step 3

Provide documentation

Submit the following supporting documentation:

- certified copies of your undergraduate and/or postgraduate qualification/s
- curriculum vitae detailing professional experience applicable to your course application, including personal statement
- other course-specific information or documents required
- if you have previously studied at Deakin under a different name, a certified copy of documentation detailing your name change.

Step 4

Submit

Submit the completed online application. You'll receive an email to confirm your submission and can also track the progress of the application in the portal.

Step 5

Accept your offer and enrol

If you are offered a place, you will need to accept and enrol as advised in your offer email.

RESEARCH APPLICATION PROCESS

Step 1

Entry pathways

Demonstrated capacity to undertake significant research in your proposed field is needed. Evidence may include: completion of an honours degree; completion of a research or coursework master's degree; comparable qualifications from international universities; relevant postgraduate research experience; independently peer-reviewed journal articles, publications or conference papers; professional reporting or prior learning; research-related awards or prizes or other evidence of research ability.

Step 2

Find our research strengths

Search our website and publications to confirm that Deakin has the expertise to supervise your project. It is recommended to make contact with potential supervisors to gain support and discuss proposed research areas.

Step 3

Research proposal

In consultation with a potential supervisor, write a research proposal to demonstrate a clear vision of what you want to study, why this is a topic of personal interest and how you will approach the research question. Your research proposal will form part of your application for candidature. Research proposal lengths vary depending on which area you propose to study.

Step 4

Further documents

Other documents you are required to submit include:

- any published research – including the name of the publication and a copy of the contents and abstract pages.

Scan and also post a certified copy of:

- proof of Australian citizenship or permanent residency, or New Zealand citizenship
- transcripts of all of your tertiary education studies except those undertaken at Deakin
- proof of your start date and evidence of any intermissions or changes of candidature if you are applying to transfer a research degree from another institution
- proof of any name changes.

Step 5

Academic referees' reports

Confidential reports from two academic referees are required.

Step 6

Apply

Once you have the relevant information, register your application online. Visit deakin.edu.au/study-at-deakin/apply/apply-for-a-research-degree.

Step 7

Enrolment

If you have been offered a place you will be emailed enrolment information with further details.

COURSES AT DEAKIN

The following table contains a list of all postgraduate courses at Deakin. Here is a rundown of how each column works.

Coursework and Research

Courses are listed in study area groupings, for example Architecture and Built Environment, Business, Communication and Creative Arts, etc. Admission requirements are listed under each course entry. To find out more about any postgraduate course at Deakin, visit deakin.edu.au/courses.

Code

You can look up course-related information online using the course code provided.

Duration (FT, years)

This is the course duration in years, based on completing the course full time (FT). Part-time courses may also be available (PT). Search for your course at deakin.edu.au/courses to find out.

In some instances you will see PT next to the year, for example 2 PT. This means that the course is only available part time.

Course lengths may vary in response to requirements within the Australian Qualifications Framework. Applicants should refer to the handbook for the latest information, deakin.edu.au/handbook.

Intake

Most courses start in Trimester 1 (T1) (March to June). This column indicates whether you have the option of commencing your studies in Trimester 2 (T2) (July to October) or Trimester 3 (T3) (November to February). Not all units are offered in every trimester. Visit deakin.edu.au for the most up-to-date information.

Fees

Fees quoted are based on 8 credit points in one year of full-time study. They should be used as a guide only and are subject to change.

Graduate certificate applicants please note: where the length of the graduate certificate is shown as 0.5 years full time, the cost displayed represents 0.5 year full-time (4 CP) not 1 year (8 CP).

Master's program applicants please note: the fees quoted are based on 8 credit points and will not be the total cost of the course.

2017 fee (8 CP)

2017 annual course fees for full fee-paying places are shown in the 2017 fee (8 CP) column. These are based on an annual full-time study load, regardless of your unit selection. If the course duration is more than 1 year full-time (1 FT), the annual fee does not represent the full cost of the course. It represents the cost of 1 year full-time study (8 CP) in 2017.

2016 indicative CSP fee

The CSP rates shown in the CSP column are indicative 2016 annual course fees. CSP fees are indicative because they are calculated based on your unit selection.

Credit point (CP)

A unit or subject is usually 1 credit point. However there are some exceptions. A course is made up of a set amount of credit points, for example a graduate certificate is usually 4 credit points of study and a graduate diploma is usually 8 credit points. Full-time study is considered 3 to 4 credit points per trimester/semester and part-time study is 1 or 2 credit points per trimester/semester.

Campus

Deakin has five campuses. The campus code indicates where the course is available. For example, the Master of Architecture is available at the Geelong Waterfront Campus.
