Director's report

We had a successful Planning Day for CrEFI, DU Management Centre on February 8 2010. Much of this was a getting to know the group as a result of CrEFI's reconfiguration in December 2009. Since then, I met with the DVC(Research), Dean and ADR (Arts and Education) in early March to have proposed budget confirmed which in turn then allows the School to determine its overall research budget. As a consequence we can now go ahead and advertise for the Administrative Officer (.6) for CrEFI which will lighten the load for Jill Loughlin who has been central in the development of CrEFI.

The Executive has met twice, largely to finalise the budget, but also to discuss the processes for allocation of funding to individuals for conferences and related activities for groups and projects. These discussions have been undertaken in close liaison with the Associate Dean (Research) so that there is consistency across the Faculty in terms of funds available to active researchers. Discussions have also been had to as to the respective roles of the Associate Head of School (Research), CrEFI, CLER and the Associate Head of School (Development).


For the above reasons there has been some delay in commencing this year's planning.

A statement is being issued by Mary Dixon with regard to the formation of the School of Education Research Guild(SERG). Each active researcher in CrEFI will be allocated \$2500 per annum for conference and related research activities (buy out teaching etc). This can be gained through submitting the form now available on the Faculty Research Office website and signed off by the Director.

The DVC(R) also determined that each Director of the SRCs is now expected to review and sign off on all grant applications.

It is now important for each of CrEFI's three Programs and the Interdisciplinary Themes to meet as groups. There is a dedicated CrEFI time allocated on Thursdays for Roundtables. The executive would like each convenor of these groups to meet and plan for the remainder of 2010 and for the next three years. In particular, we would like suggestions as to Visiting Professors who can assist in enhancing and articulating our research programs and agendas internationally (approximately \$8000 funds per Visiting Professor). These Professors

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would be expected to visit for 2 weeks or more, and to engage in a number of activities within the School, Faculty, University and wider educational community.

The Executive has also discussed membership issues. First, it has expanded the Research Committee that oversees CrEFI policy to include an ECR (Geelong), who will be Shaun Rawolle, and the Associate Head of School (Development) Alex Kostogriz. This Committee also includes another SRC Director, the ADR and Robert MacMahon as research manager. A meeting will be called soon. Second, it has been decided that there will be a review of CrEFI membership later in 2010 as a result of changes in academic staff and their research activities.

CrEFI Activities

I presented about the role of CrEFI to the HDR conference in February in Geelong and also to the Faculty Meeting called by the ADR (Arts and Ed) in March. I indicated that CrEFI should be seen as a resource for HDR students and School of Education researchers, and that the aim was to develop good research projects that make a difference.

On Friday 12th March, there were discussions held with Elvira Varcirca from Research and Policy in DEECD. These were in the areas of

- access and equity for first at university
- learning spaces and student outcomes
- partnership model of pre-service/in-service professional learning
- teacher education (ICT pedagogies)

Review of ARC grants.

All applications were reviewed in a group discussion by the various CIs, with Jill and Mary acting as external reviewers. This process was extremely productive and will be used for the review of Linkages and Central Research Grants.
