Regulation 2.4(5) – Alfred Deakin Research Institute<u>Alfred</u> Deakin Institute for Citizenship and Globalisation



This Regulation is made pursuant to Statute 2.4 – *University Institutes*.

- 1. There shall be an institute known as the <u>Alfred Deakin Research Institute</u><u>Alfred Deakin Institute for</u> <u>Citizenship and Globalisation</u>-<u>within the Faculty of Arts and Education</u>.
- 2. The objects of the Institute are to:
 - (a) generate and promote research that stimulates public debate and informs public policy;
 - (b) act as a catalyst for the development and promotion of cross-disciplinary and problem oriented approaches to research founded in the humanities, social sciences, education, law and communication studies;
 - (c) contribute to research that is regionally relevant and that has important social benefits, particularly through the establishment of internal and external strategic partnerships;
 - (d) build the University's reputation by enabling and showcasing academic teams, ideas and outcomes relevant to the communities served by the University; and
 - (c) support the continued development of Deakin University's research profile and performance through leadership, mentoring and training of higher degree by research students.
 - (a) generate and promote high-quality research that is problem-driven, globally-oriented, empirically-based and socially-beneficial;
 - (b) build the research capacity of the University and the Institute by attracting and supporting highcalibre post graduate students, early career researchers and senior researchers;
 - (c) promote and support collaboration amongst the Institute's members, students and external stakeholders;
 - (d) facilitate knowledge transfer, stimulate public debate, inform research and policy agendas and meaningfully impact lived experiences;
 - (e) create strategic partnerships, in Australia and internationally, and build relationships with leaders, policy and key opinion makers, and practitioners in order to generate cutting-edge, world-leading research in the humanities and social sciences.
- 3. The Institute shall have an Advisory Board.
- 4. The composition and terms of reference of the Advisory Board shall be established by the Vice-Chancellor.
- 5. The Advisory Board shall:
 - (a) provide advice to the Principal Officer in relation to the activities of the Institute as specified in section 2; and
 - (b) meet at least two times in each year.
- 6. The Vice-Chancellor shall appoint a Principal Officer of the Institute on such terms and conditions as he or she sees fit.
- 7. The Council may grant to the Principal Officer the rank and title of Professor.

- 8. The Principal Officer shall:
 - (a) report to the Principal Officer of the Faculty of Arts and Education and the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research); and
 - (b) within three months after 31 December in each year, present to the Advisory Board an annual report of the activities of the Institute for the preceding 12 months, including a full report on the financial affairs <u>and governance</u> of the Institute, together with any other statement or information required by the Advisory Board.
- 9. The Advisory Board shall consider the report of the Principal Officer as specified in section 8(b), and shall:
 - (a) submit the report to the Vice-Chancellor, the Principal Officer of the Faculty of Arts and Education and the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research) as soon as practicable; and
 - (b) forward it to the Academic Board for noting;

together with any comments, as it sees fit.

10. If the Vice-Chancellor concludes that the Institute is not fulfilling its objectives or ceases to be aligned to the strategic directions of the University, the Vice-Chancellor may recommend to Council that the Institute be discontinued or may recommend changes to this Regulation.
