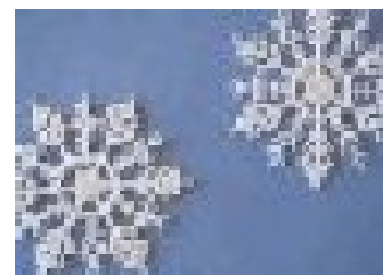

# Report on ICG Conferences

## *Islam, Human Security and Xenophobia Conference*

This International Conference jointly hosted by Deakin University and Monash University was held in Melbourne on 25-26 November 2005.

The various topics addressed at the Conference explored a set of pressing challenges in the wake of the September 11 and subsequent terrorist attacks.

The conference focused on Muslim responses to increasing political, social and security challenges in a global era. It explored the increasing salience of Islam in contemporary world politics and the impact of this salience on domestic politics in the Muslim world as well as Western states with major Muslim populations. It also considered the policies toward Islam and Muslims adopted by Australia and major international players in particular in the context of regional and civil conflicts. In addressing these issues, the conference brought together prominent researchers from Australia and overseas working on diverse but related issues ranging from human rights and civil society to international politics, human security and conflict resolution.

## *The Politics of Recognition: Identity, Respect and Justice*

This international conference was held at the Toorak Campus on 30-31 July. More than sixty Australian and international delegates attended, including keynote speaker Professor Nancy Fraser, Henry A. and Louise Loeb Professor of Politics and Philosophy at the New School for Social Research, New York. She presented a paper entitled *Abnormal Justice*. The conference proceedings will be published by *Cambridge Scholar's Press* as an edited monograph.

## *The 5th International Symposium on Processability, Second Language Acquisition and Bilingualism*

The 5th International Symposium on Processability, Second Language Acquisition and Bilingualism was held on 26-28 September 200 at Burwood campus. The Symposium featured research papers by international researchers in second language acquisition and Processability Theory including key note speakers Professor Manfred Pienemann from the University of Newcastle and Professor Gisela Håkansson from Lund University, Sweden. Prof. Manfred presented a paper entitled the Developmental and the Logical Problem in PT while Prof. Håkansson presented Processability Theory Applied to Spoken and Written L2 Swedish. The ICG chair, Project Group and the conference convenor, A/Prof. Fethi Mansouri has been invited by *Cambridge Scholar's Press* to publish the proceedings.

### *Community development in a 'global risk society'*

Melbourne, Australia

(Conference Opening: Evening 19 April 2006)

A three day conference for academics, researchers, community development practitioners and practitioner activists

*The more threatening the shadows that fall on the present day from a terrible future looming in the distance, the more compelling the shock that can be provoked by dramatizing risk today... Established risk definitions are thus a magic wand with which a stagnant society can terrify itself (Beck, U, 1999, World Risk Society, pp. 137-8).*

A number of social theorists are arguing that we now live in a global risk society where the identification of risk, risk assessment and risk management increasingly frame our everyday lives, often regardless of the objective reality of risk. Risk society enjoins us to think about threats and opportunities and to take responsibility for what happens in the future. The construction of risk society has important implications for the practice of community development. Community development is brought in to service civil society and the state, in times of disaster, to legitimate state action, and as a risk management strategy that offers to combat xenophobia and racism. Community development projects themselves are increasingly required to implement the tools of risk assessment, such as audits and evaluations. Community development programs also provide sites for creative risk-taking, for example, through the work of arts animators.

# Invitation to participate in the ICG

The Executive invites both expressions of interest in the work of the ICG and applications from staff for support with relevant research projects over the next 3 months.

## *Background*

The ICG has three research fellows to enhance the Faculty's efforts on grants, consultancies and publications in the area of *Citizenship and Globalisation*. To facilitate staff requests for work to be done by the research fellows, the ICG Project Group has established the following procedures and criteria for approving projects.

## *Procedures*

All project work by the Research Fellows is to be approved by the ICG Project Group.

- ❖ All Academic members of the faculty staff would be eligible to apply.
- ❖ Each applicant to submit to the Chair of the ICG Project Group:
  - (a) one page project application form, and → See attached sample
  - (b) the applicant (s)'s CV (s), (If applying for the first time)
- ❖ Project proposals would then be submitted to the Project Group, which would, where necessary, rank them on merit, according to the following criteria.

## *Project Criteria*

Proposals ought to be oriented towards a substantial project in the general area of Citizenship and Globalisation, that requires work on :

- ❖ Organising, preparing and writing applications for grants, tenders or consultancies, including preliminary research for this purpose.
- ❖ Publication activity, such as writing, editorial and indexing services in the production of books, book chapters or refereed articles.
- ❖ Conference or workshop organization leading to refereed publications or commercially published books.
- ❖ Where ongoing research projects require the service of a Research Fellow, and research finance (e.g. through an ARC grant) is already available, such projects would have to reimburse the ICG for the time allocated to the Research Fellow.

Proposals seeking only basic research assistance, such as for library searches and photocopying, will not be approved.
