



### Recent Events

The Citizenship and Globalisation Research Priority Area (RPA) International Advisory Seminar was held on the 6th and 8th of November at Deakin University Melbourne campus at Burwood. The three centres for the RPA, the Centre for Citizenship and Human Rights (CCHR), the Cultural Heritage Centre for Asia and the Pacific (CHCAP) and the Corporate Citizenship Research Unit (CCRU) all invited prominent scholars from overseas as speakers for the event.

The CCHR's seminar, *the Contradictions between Citizenship and Human Rights* provided an opportunity for discussions of current issues in the area of citizenship and globalisation. Professor Bryan Turner, from the Asia Research Institute, National University of Singapore presented some challenging ideas in his paper: Dr. Andrew Vandenberg responded to Bryan's paper.

Professor Gerard Delanty, an RPA (Research Priority Area) Visiting Fellow and Professor at the University of Liverpool, UK, set out a number of key issues for citizenship in Europe in his paper: *European Citizenship - a critical assessment*. Professor Geoff Stokes responded to Gerard's paper.

Professor Delanty's main conclusions were:

- While the notion of a European citizenship in the sense of a formal mode of citizenship that is specific to the EU has a certain reality, a significant development has been the Europeanization of national regimes. This has occurred under the impact of the broader context of the rise of cosmopolitan forms of citizenship.
- One of the major sites of public contestation over citizenship in Europe today lies in the domain of solidarity. What is now needed is a new debate on citizenship in Europe with a focus on the values of solidarity. This will entail bringing the social dimension back into citizenship.
- The Europeanization of citizenship has unleashed citizenship from the project of the state.
- Despite its irreducibility to nationality, citizenship cannot be totally divorced from the state, which remains the main guarantor of rights.

Prof. Jeremy Moon, Director, International Centre for Corporate Social Responsibility, Nottingham University Business School, UK presented a paper, *CSR and Government: Dichotomous and Complementary Views* at the CCRU workshop on 8<sup>th</sup> of November. Diane Sisley, Adjunct Professor, Deakin University, Former Equal Opportunity Commissioner responded to the paper. The seminar was chaired by Associate Professor Linda Hancock.

CHCAP conducted an informal seminar with Dr. Richard Engelhardt, Regional advisor for Culture in the Asia and the Pacific, UNESCO Bangkok and Dr. Colin Long, Deakin University. The title of the seminar was *Values-based Management in a Culturally Conflicted World*. The event was chaired by Adjunct Professor Liz Vines who is a Heritage architect and author of the Streetwise Practical Guide Series.

## Recent Events

### Workshop on Deliberative Democracy and Public Consultation: Australia and China Compared

29 September

*The Workshop on Deliberative Democracy and Public Consultation: Australia and China Compared* was held in Burwood Campus on 29 September.

As part of the Australian Research Council funded project on deliberative democracy, this workshop provided a forum in which scholars and practitioners both in China and Australia can exchange their opinions on and experiences in developing public consultation and deliberative institution.

Professor John Dryzek, from Australian National University, an international leading theorist in the field of deliberative democracy gave a keynote and summary speech. Other scholars from Australian universities and several local practitioners from China and Australia exchanged their ideas as in how to promote deliberative democracy to better pursue objectives for society. Importantly, the workshop gave a group of 12 official delegates from Central Party School in Beijing a new insight about the western deliberative democracy theory and the political experiment we did in Zeguo village.

## New Research Fellow

### A/ Professor Andrea Whitcomb



Andrea comes to Deakin University from Curtin where she was a senior lecturer in cultural heritage. Before becoming an academic Andrea was a history curator at the Australian National Maritime Museum and the National Museum of Australia.

Andrea's research interests focus on museums and the interpretation of cultural heritage. She is internationally known due to her book *Reimagining Museums: Beyond Mausoleums* (Routledge 2003) and her role as the founder of *Open Museum Journal* which has an international readership. She is also on the Boards of *Museum & Society*, a British journal published out of Leicester University and *Public History Review*.

At the moment Andrea is finishing an ARC Linkage Project on the history of ideas about heritage in Western Australia, focusing on the role of the National Trust of Australia (WA). She is also a CI on another ARC Linkage project, based at Curtin University looking at community meanings of war memorials in Western Australia. She has just finished co-editing a book with Chris Healy from the University of Melbourne which will be published in November 2006 through Monash University E-Press (*South Pacific Museums: An Experiment in Culture*).

Projects in the planning stages include an analysis of the role of affect in museological interpretations of revisionist histories and a project exploring the imagining of homelands in migrant groups through their collections of memorabilia.

***Local Governance, Multiculturalism and Active Citizenship: The Case of Arab-Muslim Diaspora in the West.***

#### Project Summary

This project will advance our understanding of the best practice approaches towards the management of intercultural relationships within multicultural communities. It will generate international benchmark data on the management of multicultural spaces and will lead to a range of practical policies for local city councils, NGOs and state governments. The findings will form a robust empirical basis for understanding the optimal way of formulating government NGOs partnerships in the successful implementation of culturally responsive policies. The study will also result in the development of effective policy responses aimed at enhancing active citizenship, social cohesion and intercultural understanding.

#### ***Internal and External Sources of Political Instability in East Timor***

A/Professor Damien Kingsbury and Dr Michael Leach

#### Project Summary

This two-year study will examine key challenges to political stability in the Democratic Republic of East Timor. In the context of growing regional concern over failed states and following the withdrawal of UN peacekeeping forces, it focuses on key issues of political stability as East Timor attempts to consolidate the double transition to independence and democracy, including internal dissension within the governing party; the potential for defence force/police force conflicts; the evolving role of anti-system actors, the impact of pervasive intergenerational differences and the mobilisation of Church opposition groups. The project is timed to cover the critical period of presidential and parliamentary elections in 2007.

## Research Activities

**Prof. Bill Logan** and Mr Giovanni Boccardi from UNESCO World Heritage Centre conducted a reactive monitoring mission to the World Heritage site at Hue, Vietnam, from 14 - 21 October 2006. The joint WHC-ICOMOS mission was carried out at the request of the World Heritage Committee to investigate the state of conservation at this site, which was inscribed on the World Heritage List in 1993 and comprises the royal citadel and tombs from the Nguyen dynasty (1802-1945) and associated temples. The site faces uncoordinated urban and infrastructure development, encouraged by the central government in Hanoi, which wishes to see Hue develop rapidly as one of the top eight cities in the country. The mission considered specifically the actions taken by the State Party (Vietnam) in relation to the removal of illegal buildings on the site; the development of an inventory of significant traditional buildings; progress on the establishment of a Conservation Management Plan; and the completion of an Environmental Impact Assessment for the proposed five-story tourist hotel complex at Vong Canh Hill on the Perfumed River. The mission discussed these issues at a series of meetings with the Thua Thien Hue Provincial People Committee and Hue People Committee and their agencies, and will report back to UNESCO and ICOMOS in November 2006.

The Kyoto-based League of Historical Cities held its 10th World Conference at Ballarat from 29 October to 1 November 2006 on the theme of 'Sustainable Historic Cities: Economics, Preservation and Visions for the Future'. **Prof Bill Logan**, Cultural Heritage Centre (CHCAP) Director, and Adjunct Prof Ray Tonkin, Executive Director of Heritage Victoria, were invited to join the organising committee, act as paper referees and chair some of the conference sessions. Bill was also facilitator for the four round-table sessions in which the mayors of participating League members reported on their cities followed by open discussions on the conference theme. Dr Richard Engelhardt, one of CHCAP's nominees on the Citizenship and Globalisation RPA, was the keynote speaker, and Adjunct Professor Liz Vines gave a paper entitled 'The Australian and Asian Context of Heritage City Management'.

All project work by the Research Fellows and the administrative assistant are to be approved by the RPA Project Group.

- ❖ All Academic members of the faculty staff would be eligible to apply.
- ❖ Each applicant to submit to the Chair of the RPA Project Group:
  - (a) one page project application form, and
  - (b) the applicant (s)'s CV (s),
- ❖ Project proposals would then be submitted to the Project Group, which would, where necessary, rank them on merit, according to the following criteria.

### Project Criteria

Proposals ought to be oriented towards a substantial project in the general area of Citizenship and Globalisation, that requires work on :

- ❖ Organising, preparing and writing applications for grants, tenders or consultancies, including preliminary research for this purpose.
- ❖ Publication activity, such as writing, editorial and indexing services in the production of books, book chapters or refereed articles.
- ❖ Conference or workshop organization leading to refereed publications or commercially published books.
- ❖ Where ongoing research projects require the service of a Research Fellow, and research finance (e.g. through an ARC grant) is already available, such projects would have to reimburse the ICG for the time allocated to the Research Fellow.
