Teaching is a career that can make a profound and lasting contribution to the future by positively educating and influencing the lives of students.

It is the largest profession in Australia with more than 200 000 teachers working in 10 000 schools teaching more than three million students. It is a rewarding career that offers creativity, flexibility and opportunity.

While most teachers work in state or independent primary and secondary schools teaching children and teenagers, others work in pre-schools or childcare centres with very young children, in special education with people of all ages, or with older teenagers and adults in institutes of Technical and Further Education (TAFE)/Vocational Education and Training (VET), community education centres, private colleges, universities and workplaces.

Deakin's School of Education offers a comprehensive range of undergraduate teaching courses with disciplines in health and physical education, a wide choice of arts and science subjects, a comprehensive range of major and minor secondary curriculum areas, early childhood education, as well as programs addressing specific education needs, such as Koorie teacher education.

School education is the largest sector for which our courses are designed, with pre-service and in-service courses provided for primary and secondary teaching.

You will participate in a highly-rewarding work placement program, spending at least 80 days working in schools with children and alongside experienced teachers. You will also have the opportunity to undertake a work placement in international or remote Northern Territory settings through our Global Experience Program.

This degree gives you a joint qualification in both Secondary Teaching and Arts, combining teaching studies with fields such as dance, drama, English, history, humanities, linguistics, literary studies, LOTE (Arabic, Mandarin Chinese, Italian and Indonesian), mathematics, media studies, social education, TESOL and visual arts.

You will complete at least 80 days supervised school work placement.

Career opportunities

As a graduate you will be eligible for employment as a secondary teacher in Australia and overseas. You will be able to teach in secondary schools from junior secondary to VCE levels, as well as taking up positions in community and youth performance companies, TAFE and adult community educational institutions, private academies and agencies, community arts offices, government departments and private industries and services.

Graduates of this Teaching and Science degree are qualified to teach middle level and senior science in secondary schools. The course is designed to introduce you to contemporary science and its applications, and innovative teaching and learning situations, so that you will be able to introduce and sustain innovative practices in school science that engage students and support quality learning. The Science degree will prepare you for a professional science career, as well as for careers in science-related areas such as science writing and interpretation, science advisers, administrators or managers.

The course includes a professional practice sequence designed to introduce a broader and more contemporary view of science.

You will undertake 80 days of supervised work placement organised by the Professional Experience Office as part of your completion of the course. Some of this experience will take place in non-school settings, consistent with current directions advocated by the Victorian Institute of Teaching.

Career opportunities

Graduates from this program have found careers in Australian and overseas secondary schools, government departments, universities as general staff managers, public service, TAFE and adult community educational institutions, health and welfare organisations as well as in private academies and agencies.

Graduates will be eligible to meet the requirements for registration with the Victorian Institute of Teaching, and will be able to gain employment as secondary teachers in all states and territories in Australia.

Graduates will also have opportunities to work in science-related industries, government departments, teaching, university research, public sector positions such as conservation groups and other research positions in a variety of organisations.

Admission requirements	A two-year Diploma of Children's Services or equivalent early childhood qualification and a current Level 2 First Aid Certificate. Applicants holding a three-year early childhood university qualification may apply to undertake one year of the course to upgrade to a four-year early childhood qualification.

The Bachelor of Early Childhood Education covers the education requirements of young children from birth to five year-olds and will qualify you as a teacher in childcare centres, kindergartens and early learning centres.

This course has been developed as a new teacher education program to address the potential shortage of four-year trained kindergarten and childcare centre teachers.

The Australia-wide standard for early childhood education teachers is now four years of tertiary study.

This two-year course follows on from studies undertaken at TAFE, such as a two-year Diploma of Children's Services. It is available to qualified early childhood staff and kindergarten teachers seeking to extend their studies and upgrade their qualifications to the four-year degree level.

The Bachelor of Early Childhood Education enables you to complete the course requirements of 20 credit points of study in a minimum of two years of full-time study (or part-time equivalent), inclusive of professional experience.

The course content covers all areas of program preparation, professional understandings and the experience and skills required of early childhood educators. As a course requirement, level 3 students will complete a minimum of 45 days of supervised professional experience in a range of early childhood settings.

The program is offered in two experience-based pathways: a rural, community-based program offered through the Geelong Campus at Wairn Ponds and the Warrnambool Campus, and an on-campus, city-based program offered through the Melbourne Campus at Burwood. In some instances, you will be able to combine employment with your studies. You may undertake part of your professional experience placements at your current early childhood workplace and also arrange to exchange workplaces with other students.

An honours year is available upon the completion of this degree, which can provide you with a competitive edge in the job market or a pathway into a higher degree.

Career opportunities

Graduates will have career opportunities in childcare facilities, kindergartens and early learning centres, with scope in the future for positions such as institution director, coordinator, pre-school field officer, adviser or senior adviser within early childhood facilities. Opportunities also exist for employment in government agencies, community services or in not-for-profit organisations.

Admission requirements	Primary and Secondary strands: A bachelors degree (or equivalent) in a discipline area other than education. The Early Childhood Education strand is also available to applicants with a Primary Teaching degree. In addition, if you wish to teach in secondary schools you will require studies from disciplines that enable you to qualify for two single teaching methods.	

[^] This course can be completed in 1.5 years if you undertake studies in Trimesters 1, 2, 3, and Trimester 1 in the following year, or in two years if you undertake studies in Trimesters 1 and 2 each year.

* Off-campus students are expected to take no more than two units per trimester, and should note that the normal supervised school experience requirements apply.

The Master of Teaching has the flexibility of allowing you to gain a teaching qualification in early childhood, primary or secondary teaching, as well as the option of a dual qualification in early childhood and primary or primary and secondary. This option is only available if you study over two calendar years.

The course is offered in on-campus and off-campus modes with different strands available at different campuses in order to meet the needs of metropolitan, rural and regional students.

A 16-credit-point course, the Master of Teaching enables candidates with a three-year undergraduate degree to complete the equivalent of two more years of study (four trimesters) that will allow registration as a graduate early childhood, primary or secondary teacher with a masters qualification.

This course has been developed in response to the growing trend, nationally and internationally, to require postgraduate qualifications for entry into the teaching profession, and to offer a number of pathways into the profession. A 12-credit-point Graduate Diploma of Teaching (E663) is embedded in the course. You will have the opportunity to exit the course after three trimesters with a Graduate Diploma, or to complete a fourth trimester of study to graduate with a Master of Teaching.

Career opportunities

As a graduate of the course you will be eligible to gain probationary registration for teaching in primary or secondary school settings through the Victorian Institute of Teaching, and/or become registered to teach in early childhood settings by the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development on the recommendation of Early Childhood Australia (Victorian Branch).

You will have transferable organisational, leadership, human resource management and training skills. There is a strong demand for qualified teachers, and graduate starting salaries are high compared to the graduate average.

The Graduate Diploma of Education (Applied Learning) prepares teachers and other educators to work with young people in secondary schools, TAFE and Adult and Community Education (ACE) agencies where the challenge is to adequately provide young people with knowledge, skills and values for a range of further study and employment pathways.

This course responds to the rapid changes underway in the education programs for young people aged 14 to 19. Included are the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE), Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) and VET in Schools in the post-compulsory years, and Enterprise Education and Applied Learning programs in the lower and middle secondary school years. These programs have a distinctive applied learning orientation in curriculum and teaching approaches.

The program involves 10 weeks of on-campus tutorials which are delivered at the Geelong Campus at Waurn Ponds. In between these intensives, you will undertake 45 days of professional experience placements in schools and other youth learning settings. You will use Deakin Studies Online (DSO) to continue your ongoing assignment work throughout the year, and to share your professional learning with the course lecturers and other students in the program.

To be eligible to graduate, you must also complete a Certificate IV in Training and Assessment and Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) units relevant to your VET teaching area(s). These units will not be offered as part of the course, but Deakin staff will assist you to identify appropriate training providers.

Selection

Selection into the course will particularly target professionals who have completed a degree and suitably qualified trade professionals considering teaching as a career change opportunity. People with broad qualifications considered to be relevant to the following specialist teaching areas are encouraged to apply for this course:

Technology studies

- » Design and technology (includes wood, metal, plastics, fibres/yarns/fabrics, industrial ceramics)
- » Food and technology
- » Systems and technology (includes mechanical and electrical/electronic systems and subsystems).

Vocational Education and Training (VET)

- » Agriculture, automotive, building and construction, business administration, small business practice, Cisco, community services, clothing products, dance, desktop publishing, electronics, engineering, equine industry, financial services, fitness, food processing (wine), food technology, furnishing, horticulture, hospitality (operations), information technology, laboratory skills, multimedia, music industry, retail operations, seafood industry, small business practice, sport and recreation.

Applied studies

- » Arts, science, mathematics, English, careers, information technology, media, music, environmental studies, social studies, student welfare, visual communication.

Admission requirements	You must have successfully completed an approved degree or diploma (a minimum of three years duration) other than a Bachelor of Teaching. Priority for selection is based on Grade Point Average scores from the undergraduate degree.

[^] Intensive study.

This is an initial teacher education course to enable you to complete what is usually a one-year course of study in two thirds of the time (seven calendar months full time from November to June).

This unique new course is designed to prepare graduates with an approved degree, for teaching in primary schools and provides an opportunity for you to experience studying and teaching in different educational settings. It is a specialist qualification covering all areas in primary curriculum including English language, mathematics, science, arts, social education, health and physical education and technology.

You must complete a Working with Children Check (WWCC) before being permitted to undertake activities in schools. Working with Children Checks are current for the duration of your enrolment and are applicable to government, Catholic and independent schools.

The course is delivered on campus at the Geelong Campus at Waurn Ponds with one intake per year of full-time enrolment between November and June over two intensive trimesters. You will also participate in a highly rewarding professional experience program, spending at least 45 days working in primary schools with children and alongside experienced teachers. You will have the opportunity to undertake professional experience overseas or in remote Northern Territory settings through our Global Experience Program.

Career opportunities

As a graduate you will be eligible to teach in primary schools and you will also have transferable organisational, management, human resource management and training skills. Graduates of this program will find careers in Australia and overseas primary schools.
