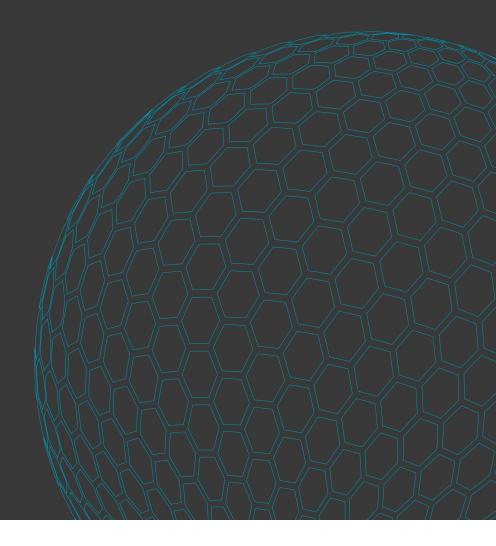

#### Director's message



Two years ago, at the beginning of 2021, the Alfred Deakin Institute for Citizenship and Globalisation (ADI) oriented its research and dissemination activities towards a gradual post-pandemic recovery. Maintaining our focus on the enduring questions, methods and objects of inquiry that animated our research prior to the pandemic, ADI also began to address the novel political, cultural, economic and social impacts of COVID-19 across the globe.

In 2022, this forward thinking and prescient approach yielded impressive results, with almost \$6 million dollars in external competitive research income awarded across the Institute, including a record 12 new Australian Research Council grants. This represents our largest number of ARC grants in a single year. And the total funding amount almost matches our 2019 high of \$6.1 million.

Whether it was the political, social and economic justice dimensions of the post-COVID recovery; the shifting geostrategic dynamics and their regional and international implications for Australia; the digital and social manifestations of extremist ideologies and their impacts on social cohesion and multicultural agendas; or the new articulations of biopolitics, (de)coloniality and political economy in the context of rapid technological change and environmental threats – ADI researchers were at the cutting-edge of emerging, multi-disciplinary scholarship both nationally and internationally.

More excitingly, 2022 saw the welcome return of field work and international travel, complementing our digital research methods honed through two years of lockdowns. Public events continued in both in-person, hybrid and fully digital modes. We hosted over 50 events across the year, including flagship disciplinary conferences the Seventh International Conference on Lao Studies, the Middle East Studies Forum Conference, the Australian Anthropology Society Annual Conference and the AVERT Research Symposium 2022.

Our publication strategy saw over 70% of our journal articles appear in high quality, Q1 ranked outlets while our books and monographs continue to find readers through major university and academic presses. And with over 500 media appearances, our research continues to be highly visible, translating into real-world impact, and bringing our unique knowledge-base to bear on public discourse and policy agendas.

The many individual awards and appointments of ADI researchers are celebrated in the report, but it is worth highlighting here the collective achievements of ADI. The Institute ranked ninth in humanities and social science research by the National Research Benchmarking Report 2022 and in the Australian's Research Magazine 2022 we are top ranked in Australia in human migration, ethnic and cultural studies and Middle Eastern and Islamic studies as well as boast the country's leading scholars in these core fields of research for the Institute.

These successes reflect and explain much of what we do as an Institute, but how we achieve such results is equally important. Every ADI member can be proud of how we continue to improve our social and intellectual connectivity across all our activities while always prioritising and focussing on staff morale and wellbeing. These 2022 achievements give the us a unique position and responsibility in humanities and social science research in order to generate the knowledge required to make sense of new and emerging challenges and to apply this to the benefit of communities locally, nationally and internationally.

As we navigate 2023, we look forward to the ongoing collaborative engagement of our partners, stakeholders and end-users. It is these partnerships that allow us to sustain the excellence of our outputs and impact of our engagement activities.

### ADI research streams



#### Culture, Environment and Science

Rapid environmental, technological and political change poses new threats and raises new questions about human life and human relationships with the environment, non-humans, and each other. At times of pandemic and unprecedented impact of human activities on the Earth system, forms of knowledge that keep together the biological, geological, and social, and move across different scales of analysis, from viruses to global sociopolitical institutions, are urgently required. This stream brings the conceptual tools, methods and approaches of the humanities and social sciences to bear on the challenging questions facing today's interconnected world, with a particular interest toward these processes in the Global South.



#### People, Place, Heritage

Relationships between people, place and the past shape lived experiences of the contemporary world. Through a diverse a diverse set of methodological approaches to investigation, including fieldwork, archival and creative practice, stream members undertake finegrained approaches to understanding and interpreting stories and lived experiences, connecting to broader political narratives about people and place. Some of the questions that animate PPH members include: How has multiculturalism and the ongoing power of settler colonialism shaped relations in contemporary Australia and our region? In what ways are processes of recognition and truth telling impacting power relations and decolonisation? What are the fault lines of belonging, diaspora and coexistence and how are these diversely navigated by individuals, communities, and governments? How can we better understand the cultural heritage and deep histories which underpin relationships and understandings of people and place? These questions take on particular salience in a post-COVID world, where the pandemic is having both short and long-term impacts on pre-existing structural inequalities.



#### Mobilities, Diversity and Multiculturalism

The MDM stream addresses the opportunities and challenges of mobilities, migration and movement in a global and digital world. Its foundational themes include new theoretical frameworks for approaching diversity, migration and anti-racism; the role of the social actor in a global, mobile and digital world; the practices of overlooked diverse groups and communities responding to global social change, and solidarities across difference. MDM research activities in 2022 focused on global politics and global mobilities in rural places; the effects of COVID-19 on multicultural communities; the changing nature of migration- and mobility-focused research practices during the pandemic; and mobility, Indigeneity and climate change activism across the global north and south.



#### Governance, Development and Peace

The GDP Stream is focused on the political, historical, ethical and strategic problems associated with contemporary practices of development, governance and peacebuilding in the Middle East and Asia-Pacific. It explores effective policymaking with respect to national, regional and global development and governance and conflict management. Our research includes studies of efforts to manage the global political economy, including crime and terrorism, civil and international conflict, post-conflict rebuilding and social reconciliation, technological innovation, the emergence of social media in the context of globalisation, and the animal turn in political life.

# Research stream highlights 2022

The following highlights from ADI's four thematic streams showcase how our events programs generate tangible outcomes, spark new and innovative research orientations, build disciplinary and interdisciplinary excellence, and connect world-leading thinkers with ADI's emerging research talent.

#### Culture, Environment and Science

- Dr Timothy Neale hosted the 'Energy, Extraction and Ethics' workshop on 21 April 2022 at Deakin Downtown. The event included presentations from ADI members and affiliates Timothy Neale, Kirsty Howey, Will Smith and Tyler King, as well as colleagues from other universities: Matthew Kearnes (UNSW), Kari Dahlgren (Monash), Randi Irwin (Newcastle), Liam Grealy (Sydney), Sally Babidge (UQ), Tom Ozden-Schilling (Johns Hopkins) and Canay Ozden-Schilling (NUS). From the workshop, a DP24 application to the ARC led by Neale was developed as well as a journal article by Neale, Howey, Dahlgren and Kearnes that is currently under review.
- Professor Miguel Vatter led an innovative workshop on the theme of 'Political Ecologies of Planetary Health: History, Sociology, Law', funded by a collaborative ADI grant for the Culture, Environment and Science (CES) research stream took place on 25– 26 July 2022 with the participation of Prof. Margaret Davies (Flinders University, School of Law). Prof. Davies gave a well-attended public lecture entitled, Turbulent Flow and the Emergence of Planetary Norms. It was followed the next day by an HDR masterclass in collaboration with Miguel Vatter on The relation between Rights of Nature and Planetary Health'. The masterclass was also attended by other Melbourne-area specialists in environmental law and ecological philosophy. Prof. Davies is collaborating with Miguel Vatter on a DP24 application on normativity in nature; the ground was prepared in this workshop for future collaboration on ARC grants together with Maurizio Meloni and Miguel Vatter on the topic of planetary health.
- A/Prof Maurizio Meloni ran the the second workshop on Political Ecologies of Planetary Health: History, Sociology, Law' funded by a collaborative ADI grant for the Culture, Environment and Science (CES) research stream. Prof. Guy Geltner Monash addressed the longue durée history of public health intervention beyond modernistic biases the limit this history to the post Enlightenment period. As Geltner claims, Tracing how these programs were designed and enforced illuminates the negotiation of biopower and the influence of GeoPower in an era supposedly devoid of either. Moreover, interventions emphasised bodies' plasticity and the interaction between individual bodies, groups and their moral/spiritual and material environment in ways that foreshadow recent discoveries in epigenetic research, albeit in a very different natural-philosophical paradigm. Collectively these insights challenge the conventional chronology, geography and periodisation in public health history.
- The Earth Unbound Collective continued to meet, share, learn and unlearn though 2022. The year wrapped up on an exciting note with the finalisation of a contract with Bristol University Press for an edited collection of written contributions from members of the Earth Unbound Collective. This book, entitled, Moving Towards Planetary Justice: Stories and Studies of Action, Resistance and Solidarity is being co-edited by Michele Lobo, Eve Mayes and Laura Bedford and will published in mid-2024. So far, the editors have received, reviewed and provided feedback on 12 contributions, including chapters, interludes and poetry. Work on the book will continue through 2023.

The HDR and ECR workshop, 'Metabolic matterings' was lead by Christopher Mayes and Carina Trutys. This was a successful workshop held over two days at Deakin Downtown and the Institute for Postcolonial Studies. Day 1 involved a keynote presentation from Dr Sophie Chao (USYD), which was also streamed on YouTube. This was followed by participants, including three ADI HDRs, presenting short overviews of their research projects. We then had a fieldtrip to an art gallery, where we were given a tour of the metabolic related art works. Day 2 began with a discussion, followed by 'q and a', between Dr Sophie Chao and Dr Kelly Donati (William Angliss Institute) about the different challenges and approaches to food-related humanities research. This was followed by a time for writing and workshopping ideas that contribute to HDR research and theses.

#### People, Place, Heritage

- 'Multicultural Museums: Diasporic Culture, Australian Heritage', was an engaging and well-attended workshop led by Virginie Rey, bringing together cultural heritage and museum studies scholars and practitioners.
- The publication of Beyond Global Food Supply Chains: Crisis, Disruption, Regeneration (Palgrave), an edited collection re-examining contemporary food systems, was edited by Victoria Stead and Melinda Hinkson, with contributions from multiple ADI researchers and other national and global colleagues.
- The People, Place and Heritage works-in-progress seminar series, brought together scholars in a collegial environment to workshop and develop new scholarship.

#### Governance, Development and Peace

- The series, 'Sharp Power, led by Professor Ihsan Yilmaz, staged a range of webinar panels on authoritarian sharp power and its influence on democracies, in collaboration with the European Center of Populism Studies (ECPS). A total of six sessions between 9 November to 14 December 2022 were organised and well attended by a global audience.
- Luke Heemsbergen and his team organised a oneday interdisciplinary workshop on 28 July 2022. The program featured 'documentary-making as research method' and 'making documentaries as a form of knowledge production'.

- A panel discussion, Transitioning to Life after
   Parliament: Issues and Evidence from Victoria, was
   held by Dr Zim Nwokora and his team presenting
   findings from a project led by Deakin University which
   investigated the experiences of former members.
- The panel, 'New Planetary Perspectives on Geopolitics'
  was organized by a team led by Professor Miguel
  Vatter. This one-day workshop on 30 August 2022
  explored some implications for our understanding
  of 'geopolitics' from the emerging perspective of the
  'planetary turn' in the social sciences.
- The symposium, 'Migrants' voices in the 2022
   Australian federal election: the perspective from
   non- Anglo social platforms', was organised by Luke
   Heemsbergen and Fan Yang at Deakin Downtown
   with the aim to map out immigrants' diverse civic
   engagements with the 2022 Australian federal election
   across non-English social platforms such as Weixin
   or WeChat, Douyin or TikTok, Weibo, or Red or across
   mainstream platforms in non-English languages.

#### Mobilities, Diversity and Multiculturalism

- 'In Our Language: Community Media in Times of Crisis' was a significant stream research project with strong local partnerships investigating the role of community language media during the pandemic
- 'Objects for Everyday Resilience' was an interactive exhibition exploring how material objects can build everyday resilience for marginalised and vulnerable communities held at Deakin Downtown and enjoying high visitor numbers.
- The workshop, 'Dislocating Coloniality: Lived and Digital Religious Flows across the Indian and Pacific Oceans', was an international event centering First Nations' perspectives on coloniality and religion in our region.

### Our research excellence

Field work and conference travel returned to pre-pandemic levels in 2022, supplementing the range of digital methodologies used by ADI throughout the pandemic. This restored mobility drove our remarkable success in attracting high-calibre students, produce world-leading research and attract significant new funding.

ADI continued to be an engine-room for success in competitive research schemes across the university, building on the remarkable ten ARCs we won last year (doubling the number of competitive grants awarded in 2020). We received a further 12 new ARC grants in 2022. Success in these highly competitive schemes reflects the scholarly rigour and innovative research our staff undertake and is a testament to the vibrant research culture at the Institute, which attracts and nurtures top-performing talent from HDR students, early-and mid-career researchers and field leaders.

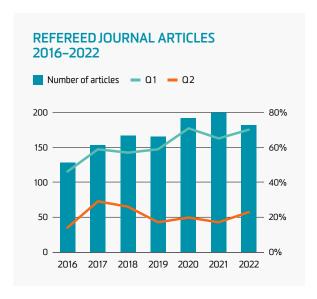
Journal publishing metrics have been restored to our prepandemic levels and aspirations, with 70+% percent of our articles published in SCImago Q1-ranked journals and a further 19% in Q2 journals.

ADI researchers had 12 sole-authored and multi-authored volumes published with significant international and university presses and a further 7 edited collections. ADI researchers had books published with major university presses, such as Cornell University Press, Amsterdam University Press, Oxford University Press, University of Chicago Press alongside major academic publishers, such as Palgrave, Routledge and Bloomsbury.

In addition to the above collective indicators of scholarly excellence, recognition by general audiences for our work continues. Dr Jason Gibson, for example, was awarded the 2022 W.K Hancock Prize from the Australian Historical Association for his book Ceremony Men. Professor Gaye Sculthorpe was awarded the global impact award for the 2022 Global Australian Awards for her work in First Nations cultural preservation and promotion globally. A/Prof. Matthew Sharpe was awarded the Australasian Association of Philosophy Media Prize for 2022. And Dr Monique Mann recognised on the international list of 100 Brilliant Women in Al Ethics for 2022.

#### Sustained excellence

ADI has sustained the quality of our publications output, with stable growth in both the volume and quality of our publications since 2016 and which we sustained throughout the challenging pandemic years.

## Our research impact

In addition to a range of impact activities researchers undertake as part of their projects, ADI generates impact through our engagement with policymakers and within public debate. Through our signature quarterly Public Policy Forums – and formal submissions to a range of governmental inquiries, reviews and commissions – our researchers influenced a range of policy areas.

#### **Public Policy Forums**

Hosted by ADI's Professor Greg Barton, ADI's Public Policy Forums attracted broad public interest on a range of agenda-setting and timely topics. Bringing together public figures and leading experts from a range of fields to discuss social and political issues of immediate relevance to a public audience, the forums saw audiences between 30-60 attend each event.

As the world grappled with the largest military encounter in Europe since the Second World War, the year started with the timely forum, *Ukraine and the Russian Invasion*, featuring leading-scholars, Dr Julie Fedor, former-ADI researchers, Dr Filip Slaveski, and Dr Robert Horvath.

The Australia–Japan defence and security relationship was the focus our second Public Policy Forum, which saw politics and international relations scholars engage with military strategists as well as the Japanese Ambassador to Australia, Shingo Yamagami.

Drawing on expertise within and beyond the Institute, the third forum looked at the contestations around *Engaging with Aboriginal History* and featured contributions from Dr Jason Gibson, Professor Gaye Sculthorpe, Dr Vanessa Russ and Academic Director (Indigenous Research) Dr Julie Andrews.

Our final event for the year reflected on two decades of transformative challenges and cooperation in countering terrorism in the wake of the Bali bombings.

Dr Adams is a human geographer and science and technology studies scholar, who studies adaptive governance in the domains of climate change response, renewable energy and public health.

# Project: The pragmatic holism of models: Integrating climate science for adaptation in health and energy.

Making knowledge about climate change relevant and usable in specific sectors and communities is a core challenge of adapting to its unfolding impacts. This project investigates the role of modelling in integrating diverse data, disciplines, and actors within common frameworks for adaptation in the energy and health sectors in Australia. By understanding the processes and practices by which models and modellers achieve this integration, this comparative study will generate insights into how models order new and existing commitments, considerations and concerns within these sectors and thereby shape the kinds of futures being pursued.

#### Dr Charishma Ratnam

Charishma Ratnam is a Human Geographer and Alfred Deakin Postdoctoral Research Fellow at the Alfred Deakin Institute for Citizenship and Globalisation (ADI) at Deakin University. Her research spans a number of areas, primarily focusing on refugee and migrant experiences and resettlement, inclusion, and home-making practices. Charishma is particularly interested in developing novel research approaches including digital, visual, ethnographic, and walking methods with participants to better understand their experiences of/in/with place(s).

# Project: Sri Lankan forced migrants and the role of digital devices in the everyday dimensions of resettlement.

Digital devices, such as smartphones, are integral to forced migration and resettlement. In addition to increasing reliance on apps to access essential services, social media provides decisive points of contact and connection with family and friends in home countries. Yet, little attention is given to understanding how digital devices and social media facilitate the process of homemaking for forced migrants (or not) as they resettle in new and unfamiliar places.

This research will adopt an innovative 'social media scroll back' method to focus on the use of the digital in everyday dimensions of resettlement. How digital devices and social media permeate resettlement is critical to this inquiry. That is – I want to find out how aspects of resettlement are produced, articulated, and curated on digital devices and for social media.

The aim of this research is to examine the ways that Sri Lankan refugees' and asylum seekers' everyday dimensions of resettlement are (re)produced and (re) presented on digital devices and for social media.

## New ARC grants

In 2022 the Australian Research Council awarded a total of \$3,515,387 to projects led or involving ADI researchers within the Linkage, Discovery, Future Fellowship and DECRA programs.

### Civilisationist mobilisation, digital technologies and social cohesion

### **ARC - Discovery Projects, Deakin University-led**Prof Ihsan Yilmaz

Civilisational populist rulers polarise societies mainly along religious lines. They also interfere with their emigrants, mobilising supporters against other expatriates. This project aims to advance knowledge of authoritarian states' transnational influence on social cohesion and inter-group conflict. By studying Islamist and Hindutva civilisationist mobilisations, their reach into their emigrants via digital technologies, and their impact on Turkish and Indian groups in Australia, the project aims to assist policy makers and community groups by generating conceptual frameworks, benchmarking data, and recommendations for making policies to deal with this phenomenon's negative effects and for developing intervention strategies.

#### Preventing water theft in the Murray-Darling Basin

### **ARC - Discovery Projects, Deakin University-led**Prof Reece Walters

This Project aims to understand the complex interaction of socio-economic, legal and political factors that have enabled the theft of fresh water in the Murray-Darling Basin. By analysing the policies and regulations governing freshwater management, this project expects to generate new knowledge of the extent and types of water theft, offenders processed, penalties delivered, and the performance and operations of regulatory and enforcement agencies. The expected outcomes include new research strategies for water theft prevention. This will benefit national security and community health by contributing to a sustainable and equitable supply of fresh water.

### Collecting and archiving social movements to build historical literacy

#### ARC - Discovery Projects

Prof Andrea Witcomb, Wollongong University-led

This project aims to investigate how the history of social movements has been collected, catalogued and curated by archives and museums. It is significant because it will make these histories available to form an equitable and inclusive civic culture. An expected outcome is an interdisciplinary approach producing new knowledge about citizens' roles in shaping private and public collections, and about the use of these collections to shape memory and generate wider historical literacy. Benefits include providing insight into inclusive physical and digital collecting practices, which enables the project to address UNESCO's goal of achieving greater access to decision-making about culture, heritage and the formation of social identities.

### Understanding the drivers and motivators of extremist violence

#### ARC - Discovery Projects

Prof Michele Bianca Grossman, Swinburne-led University

Despite intense interest in the issue, our understanding of and ability to respond to extremist violence is limited. This innovative program of research is designed to establish an empirical foundation for understanding and responding to extremist violence in Australia. It aims to examine risk and protective factors for such violence, the needs of those susceptible to committing such acts, and the effectiveness of intervention. Findings are expected to inform health, national security, social welfare, and justice agencies in their pursuit to identify those at risk of offending, address their clinical needs and manage the risk of harm they pose to society and to themselves.



#### Online anti-racism for Australia

#### **ARC** - Discovery Projects

Prof Yin Paradies and Dr Jehonathan Ben, Western Sydney University-led

Harmful manifestations of online racism are increasing. The neo-liberal assumption is that social media users and user groups can be responsiblised to disrupt online racism. This project analyses a subset of online antiracism campaigns. The review provides the material to test effectiveness, using surveys. The survey findings will identify the ingredients for effective, safe and efficient online anti-racism intervention. An online anti-racism program will be developed, implemented and evaluated. The development of guidelines for online anti-racism will overtly address the challenges and risks of action in this environment where regulation is so heavily contested.

### Regulating predictive technologies for preventive counterterrorism

#### ARC - DECRA

A/Prof Shiri Krebs, Deakin University-led

This project aims to improve the legal regulation of predictive technologies for preventive counterterrorism measures. The project expects to generate new knowledge in counterterrorism law and policy using doctrinal, comparative, and empirical methods. In particular, the project collects data on the United Nations Security Council's resolutions mandating collection, sharing, and use of predictive technologies to strengthen global counterterrorism, and examines how these resolutions influence security and human rights in Australia and its security partners. Expected outcomes include recommendations for improving the laws governing the use of predictive technologies and strengthening security, individuals' human rights, and the rule of law.

### Narrating the roles of animals in cultural burning

#### ARC - DECRA

Dr Marcus Baynes-Rock, Deakin University-led

This research aims to produce knowledge of the ways in which humans and animals co-construct landscapes via the medium of cultural burning. It will be the first multispecies ethnography of people and animals on Native Title land engaged in landscape modification based on the use of cultural fire. Taking its lead from Indigenous partners this research will develop narratives of how humans, and animals co-construct landscapes via the medium of fire within wider socio-ecological frameworks. These narratives will inform policy and practice with regard to forest management, protection of species, conservation management, bushfire mitigation, promotion of biodiversity, and Indigenous health.

### Exploring the digital divide in the ageing migrant's personal home

#### ARC - DECRA

Dr Earvin Cabalquinto, Deakin University-led

This project aims to investigate the experiences of ageing migrants in accessing and using digital communication technologies in their personal home settings. Taking the case of elderly Filipino-Australians, and deploying multi-sited ethnography and visual methods, this project expects to generate new knowledge on the consequences of digital divide on their personal and social wellbeing. Expected outcomes include culturally appropriate recommendations and resource materials to determine and reduce communication barriers for ageing migrants, migrant communities, policy makers, and relevant stakeholders. This should provide significant benefits in enhancing ageing migrants' connective capacities to navigate a secure digital landscape.

### Muslim museums: curating Islam in multicultural societies

#### ARC - DECRA

Dr Virginie Rey, Deakin University-led

This project aims to determine how contemporary Muslim communities use museums as a medium to think about and display their collective identities in non-Muslim-majority societies. Drawing on a comparative ethnographic study of Muslim-led museums across Australia, Europe, and North America, the project expects to generate new knowledge about how Muslim communities collect, curate, and exhibit their heritage in a comparative frame. Outcomes include the first transnational study of Muslim museums and a radio documentary on the Islamic Museum of Australia. Anticipated benefits include a greater understanding of the experiences of communities in caring for their heritage and improved competency in displaying multicultural heritage in museums.

### Coexisting with coronaviruses: Rethinking the emergence of the pandemic

### **ARC – Future Fellowship, Deakin University-led** A/Prof Eben Kirksey

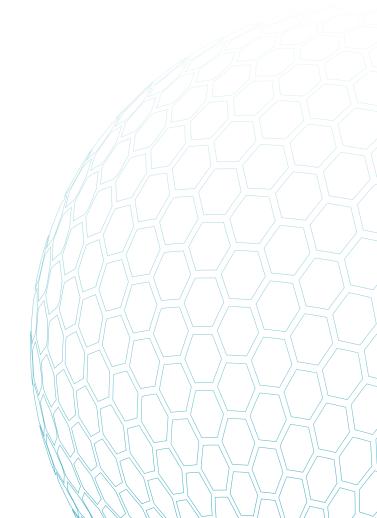
Coexisting with Coronaviruses: Rethinking the Emergence of the Pandemic. Before COVID-19 disrupted modern life, benign coronaviruses were circulating among people and animals in Southeast Asia. As medical researchers work to control the spread of this infectious disease, multispecies ethnography has a special role to play in generating basic knowledge about coronaviruses. This project aims to understand how interactions between people and multiple animal species generated a virus with pandemic potential. Approaches from science studies and the environmental humanities will generate conceptual innovations related to three themes: viral visibility, coexistence, and pathogen emergence. Innovations in multispecies methods should produce knowledge about viruses with broad benefits that may safeguard future health.

### Mobilising Dutch East India Company collections for new global stories

#### ARC - Linkage Projects

Prof Andrea Witcomb, University of Western Australia-led

Australia has a rich legacy of archives, art and artefacts, including 4 shipwrecks in WA, from its history of encounters with the Dutch East India Company (VOC). Through comparative research in Australian and overseas museums and archives we aim to situate Australian collections in a global context, creating new stories about Australia as part of the VOC global network. An interdisciplinary team will train 3 ECRs and 7 HDRs and forge partnerships with the Netherlands, Britain, Denmark, Germany, Sweden, Indonesia, Malaysia, and South Africa, strengthening national capacity. Our analysis will enrich the value of collections, provide narratives for museums and sites, and revitalise content for international and domestic tourism markets.

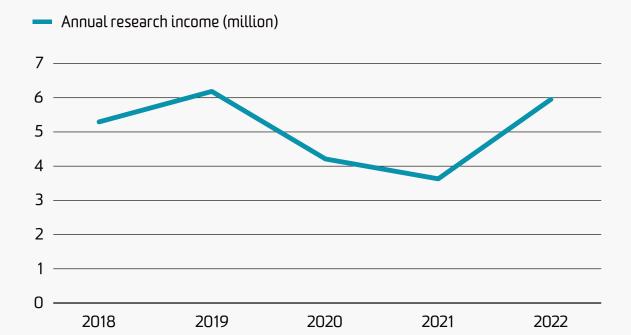

# ADI centres and the UNESCO Chair

ADI is an incubator and home for innovative large-scale research groupings. Continuing our long-standing support of CRIS, the Institute welcomed a new centre into our research environment, the Centre for Contemporary Histories, in 2022.

#### Centre for Contemporary Histories (CCH)

The Centre for Contemporary Histories (CCH), as of January 2023, is located in the Alfred Deakin Institute for Citizenship and Globalisation (ADI) hosted by Deakin University. It is a dynamic, diverse and distinctive research centre that delivers and translates high-quality research into outcomes that are relevant and meaningful to contemporary society.

Since it was established in 2015, CCH has become a critical research body to understand the uses of history in public debate and the unfinished business of the modern past.

Under the leadership of co-directors Professor David Lowe and Professor Cassandra Atherton, and the academic input of senior scholars such as Associate Professor Clare Corbould, Associate Professor Tony Joel, and Professor Andrew Singleton the CCH brings together more than 50 researchers working on topics ranging from Australia's Indigenous past, the material transmission of culture, religious change in Australia, to the political uses of history, revolution in Europe and modern Pacific history.

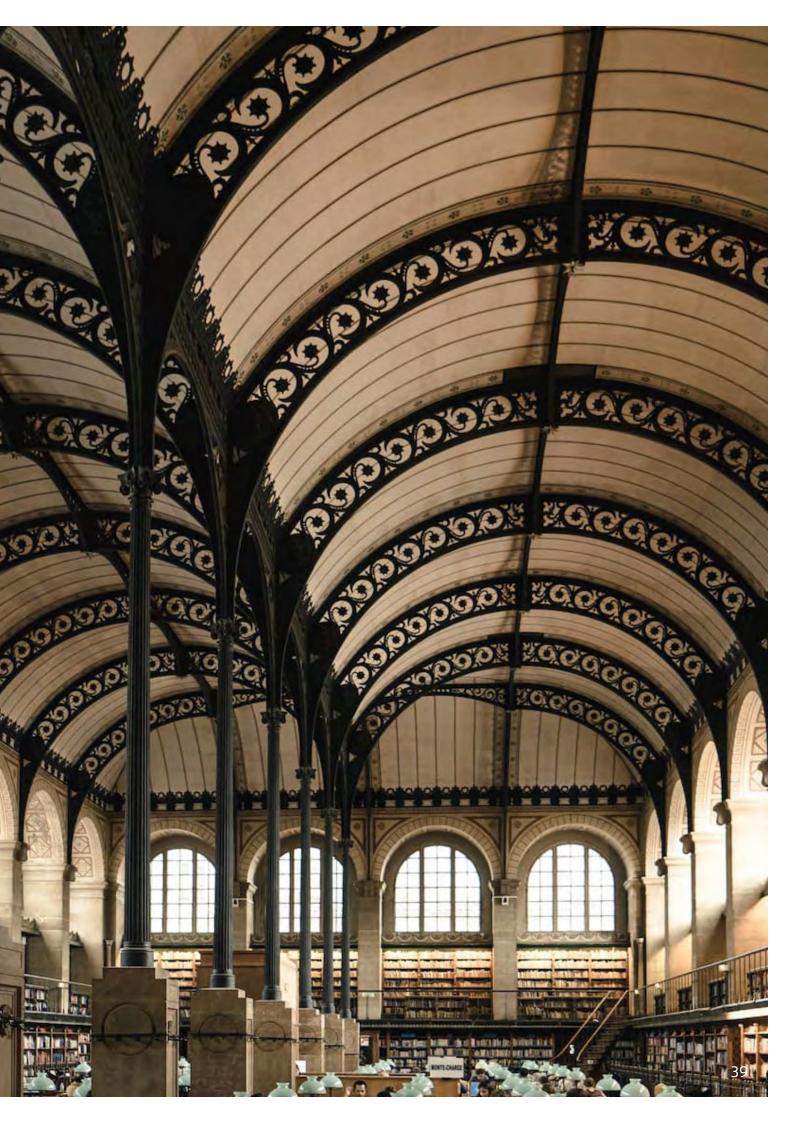
### Centre for Resilient and Inclusive Societies (CRIS)

CRIS is an independent think-tank involving university and civil society partners, led by the Alfred Deakin Institute for Citizenship and Globalisation (ADI) hosted by Deakin University. We undertake research on some of the trickiest challenges that our society is facing – racism, societal division, systemic bias and disadvantage, economic inequities, extremism and discrimination.

Our team is passionate about creating meaningful social change. We produce robust evidence and rigorous analysis that shapes policies for social inclusion and resilience and supports people and communities working in these fields.

# The UNESCO Chair for Comparative Research on Cultural Diversity and Social Justice

ADI and since 2013 is also host to the UNESCO Chair for Comparative Research on cultural diversity and Social Justice. Premised on a social justice and human rights-based approach, the Chair's agenda contributes to capacity building in the key areas of governance, education and the management of cultural diversity both in Australia and internationally. The Chair-holder and his team initiate and coordinate collaborative research on youth from vulnerable communities and involving less developed countries, focussing on the critical questions of marginalisation, social exclusion, identity formation, discrimination, radicalisation, violence and security.



### Research networks

Our research networks – traversing disciplinary, methodological and geographical boundaries – drive ADI's collaborations across institutions, faculties, and borders. Running internal and public-facing programs, ADI networks amplify the Institutes expertise to target audiences.

In the context of the Faculty of Arts and Education new research ecology established at the beginning of 2023, the networks landscape will be amended and communicated accordingly in future reporting activities.

#### **Our Networks**

### AVERT (Addressing Violent Extremism and Radicalisation to Terrorism) Research Network

AVERT members conduct cutting-edge research that engages deeply with communities, policymakers and practitioners to develop new knowledge, ideas and evidence bases for how to best address the challenges and harms posed by violent extremist ideology and action. We work with the conviction that challenging terrorism cannot be disengaged from broad concerns with strengthening social cohesion and protecting human rights.

### International Research Network on Multiculturalism (IRNM)

This network is an academic forum aimed at promoting and disseminating interdisciplinary research on the multifaceted multicultural research agenda. The group debates multicultural, intercultural and inter-religious policies, practices, theories, histories and controversies.

#### Middle East Studies Forum (MESF)

The Middle East Studies Forum (MESF) is a network of world-class researchers and lecturers in the field of Middle East and Central Asia studies and languages. MESF manages a number of high-profile international grants and teaching initiatives, and regularly hosts international and national events and seminars. MESF is convened by Prof Shahram Akbarzadeh.

#### Philosophy and History of Ideas (PHI)

PHI is the largest centre in Victoria focusing on philosophy and the history of ideas. In a period widely criticised for its loss of historical memory, PHI is founded on the conviction that we are the inheritors of rich philosophical traditions, from Europe and around the world, that remain worthy of study.

#### Politics and International Studies (POLIS)

The Politics and International Studies (POLIS) group is a research network of political science and international relations scholars who seek to understand and interpret political phenomena, driven by a willingness to move beyond traditional conceptual and empirical boundaries.

#### Deakin Science and Society Network (SSN)

To meet the great challenges of this century, scientists and humanities and social science researchers need to work together. No single academic field can bring about the changes we need to see in the world. Bridging disciplinary divides is the key to finding new solutions to the problems we face. Climate change, habitat and biodiversity loss, food and water security, and global health are among some of humanity's biggest challenges. These issues are interconnected and require social researchers and scientists to work together to develop solutions. The Deakin Science and Society Network reaches across the disciplinary divides of our universities and institutions, and the divides between research, policy and practice. We emphasise the effective communication and translation of research, as the benefits of knowledge can't be fully realised unless information is shared widely across different audiences.

#### Deakin Critical Animal Studies Network (DCAS)

The Deakin Critical Animal Studies Network aims to create an academic-activist space where animals are recognised also as persons, and humans as animals. In this era of the anthropocene, the Deakin Critical Animal Studies Network invites critical reflection to address the challenge of anthropocentrism in our ways and practices.

#### **AVERT**

2022 AVERT International Research Symposium -This year's AVERT International Research Symposium, The Space Between: New Directions for CVE Interventions' – was held at Deakin Downtown from 21-22 November, attracting over 200 in-person registrants as well as online presentations and participants. The research symposium engaged with the latest research and practice perspectives on CVE intervention, bringing together Australian and international researchers and practitioners and policymakers at the forefront of the field to engage with the latest research, evidence and insights. The Symposium's keynote speaker was the distinguished USA terrorism studies scholar Professor John Horgan, Georgia State University, whose presentation on 'Terrorism in a Time of Ideological Promiscuity' prompted a fresh rethink on the understanding and approaches to terrorist and violent extremist motivation.

- AVERT webinars and workshops in 2022 Our webinar and workshop program in 2022 included highly engaging and informative presentations by leading terrorism studies scholars on conspiracy theories and extremism (Prof. Jan Willem van Prooijen, Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam, Netherlands), developments in online extremism (Prof. Maura Conway, Dublin City University, Ireland), far-right identitarianism and the Great Replacement conspiracy (Dr Imogen Richards, Deakin University, Australia) and the early detection of youth violent extremism by civil society practitioners (Annemarie van de Weert, Research Centre for Social Innovation, Netherlands). AVERT also convened a highly successful workshop for countering violent extremism (CVE) practitioners on fluid or mixed ideologies in the current violent extremist landscape, featuring Prof. John Horgan (Georgia State University) and Associate Prof. Mario Peucker (Victoria University).
- **AVERT Community Roundtable** Engaging with community stakeholders is an important part of the AVERT Research Network's mission to understand, address and reduce the social harms caused by radicalisation to violent extremism and terrorism. In 2022 AVERT conducted its inaugural community roundtable after several years of being thwarted by pandemic restrictions, providing an important opportunity to hear from impacted and engaged community members to help build and strengthen relationships among researchers and community stakeholders. Our inaugural roundtable featured dialogue with a number of community stakeholders including as the Australian Muslim Women's Centre for Human Rights, Australian Muslim Advocacy Network (AMAN), Executive Council for Australian Jewry, Islamic Council of Victoria, Board of Imams Victoria, and others.
- AVERT-McCain Institute Dialogue In August 2022 AVERT was pleased to host a delegation of the University of Arizona-based McCain Institute national security fellows and senior McCain Institute directors from their National Security program, including director Nick Rasmussen, for a roundtable at Macquarie University in Sydney. AVERT members engaged with McCain Institute national security fellows on shared geostrategic and domestic challenges among Five Eyes partner countries, comparative approaches to countering violent extremism, and ideas on how to further engagement among the government, research and industry sectors.

 AVERT publications – In 2022, AVERT commissioned two competitively assessed and awarded rapid evidence assessments through funding from the Department of Home Affairs on disquised compliance in CVE interventions, and on the relationship between neurodiversity and violent extremism. These rapid evidence assessments, conducted by teams of AVERT members and associated colleagues, provide up-todate critical appraisals of leading research on these topics for use by academic researchers, practitioners and policymakers. In 2022 AVERT also provided an expert submission and in-person testimony to the Victorian Parliamentary Inquiry on Extremism in Victoria, which helped frame the Victorian Government's policy consideration of these issues. In addition, AVERT members also contributed to two other expert government submissions involving the Stage 2 Review of the Terrorism (Community Protection) Act 2003 and the proposed banning of Nazi symbols in Victoria. Finally, AVERT members led the publication of a special journal issue on terrorist risk assessment for the Journal of Policing, Intelligence and Counter Terrorism, quest-edited by AVERT co-convenors Prof. Michele Grossman and Lydia Khalil at Deakin University, along with AVERT Executive Committee member Prof. Adrian Cherney at University of Queensland.

#### SSN

- The SSN grants program returned this year and
  we invited applications for both Establishment
  and Incubator grants. The successful applicants
  demonstrate the incredible range of expertise at
  Deakin. Projects are led by researchers in the Faculty
  of Science, Engineering and Built Environment, the
  Faculty of Health, School of Information Technology,
  and the Institute for Frontier Materials (IFM). They
  address topics as diverse and vital as emotional
  wellbeing in space, novel bowel cancer screening
  options, contract cheating identification, decolonising
  secondary science education, collaborative computing
  applications for smart cities, and sustainable pigments
  from textile waste.
- The SSN provided support and network opportunities for Australia's postgraduate and early-to-mid career research community within Science and Technology Studies. We facilitated a journal writing workshop, hosted our 2022 SSN Visiting Scholar Dr Randi Irwin (University of Newcastle), and co-organised the 2022 AusSTS workshop held at Deakin Downtown.

 The SSN also continued to grow in its international reach over this past year. We hosted seminars by several international speakers, including Prof. Anne Pollock (Kings College London) and Prof. Stephanie Lloyd (Laval University), amongst others. Meanwhile, our Convener Dr Timothy Neale was chosen to become Editor of the Q1 STS journal Science, Technology, & Human Values.

#### PHI

- ADI co-sponsored and promoted PHI-member events, notably the Deakin Philosophy Seminar Series, which included 14 in-person and hybrid events, and the book launch of The Viral Politics of COVID-19 co-edited by PHI-member Prof Miguel Vatter and Prof Vanessa
- PHI proudly hosted the 5th International Association for the Philosophy of Death and Dying conference.
- PHI members continued to produce the kind of work that will make an impact beyond disciplinary confines and foster ongoing collaborations. These include supervisions of interdisciplinary projects, collaborative presentations and publications with colleagues from various different fields, and contributing to the Faculty's strategic partnerships with international institutions.
- PHI members were also active in public outreach throughout the year, engaging with schools, community groups and the media and promoting the value of public philosophy.

#### **POLIS**

- In 2022, Polis members published articles in some of the world's leading journal in Politics and International Relations, including: Governance, Development and Change, Political Research Quarterly, Third World Quarterly, Nations and Nationalism, Cooperation and Conflict, Global Policy, the Australian Journal of International Affairs, and the Australian Journal of Political Science.
- Polis members also secured significant research funding from several prestigious bodies, including: the Australian Research Council Discovery and Linkage schemes, the Humanitarian Leadership Academy, the Gerda Henkel Foundation, the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada, the Korea Foundation, the United Nations Population Fund, and the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

- Polis hosted several flagship events and one-day symposiums. One real highlight was a public event on the Voices Movement and the 2022 Australian Federal Election which included a presentation from Dr Monique Ryan who went on to win the seat of Kooyong.
- Polis also hosted 7 webinars and 4 panels, featuring prominent international and domestic experts. They covered topics as diverse as: Environmental Justice, Indigenous Politics, Gender in Foreign Policy and State Transformation in China.
- In addition, Polis also hosted several annual events: a full-day staff-student convocation, a HDR conference and a Journal Article Workshop, designed for members who are actively targeting top journals in the fields of Politics and International Relations.
