My next chapter:


After completing multiple auditing internships, I have landed a full-time graduate role at Deloitte in the Audit & Assurance department which aligns with my career aspirations.

Could you please introduce yourself?

Hi there, I'm Henry – I was a VCPEP scholar between 2016 and 2019, during which time I completed my Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Laws (Hons). I completed my degree online from Tasmania, where I still live – I love it down here.

Tell us about your current role. What do you do?

At present I am kept busy with a few different roles, which I enjoy because they give me some variety. I am the Managing Senior Associate and Practice Leader for Dispute Resolution and Litigation at Wise Law, which operates out of Melbourne, where I am responsible for managing a diverse and busy legal practice area where I deal with a variety of high stakes and interesting legal matters. Currently, I am seconded to Australian Army Headquarters as a Legal Officer, where I act for the Department of Defence in matters such as work health and safety, personal injury, administrative law, discipline law, humanitarian law and coronial inquests. I am also a serving Army Reservist.

In what ways are you leading a bold and exciting career?

I've been very fortunate to have been provided with opportunities to work in a range of diverse and niche areas of legal practice, where I have been able to establish a profile and develop constructive relationships with other practitioners and the community. Being responsible for significant matters such as a multi-million dollar dispute concerning a cybersecurity breach, driving the Army's response to legislation proposed by a new federal government, through to acting for vulnerable people in criminal proceedings, has provided me with the opportunity to obtain a wide variety of exposure and experience which I have thoroughly enjoyed.

Has there been a pivotal experience in your career to date you would like to share?

I've been fortunate to have a diverse and high tempo career to date, but there have been a few moments which have been quite special. One of those moments was when I set a precedent in Tasmania when I was a prosecutor working for Tasmania Police. The decision related to a new legislative provision which had not yet been considered by the courts — and I was able to convince the magistrate that my interpretation was the preferable one! The decision was published and is now regularly relied upon by criminal lawyers in Tasmania in drink driving cases.

How did Deakin and the VCPEP set you up to succeed?

I owe a lot to Deakin and the VCPEP. The networking was a key benefit. As a distance student, it is easy to feel isolated and separated from your peers due to the geographical separation and due to pre-existing notions that distance students are somehow lesser than on-campus student. I'm very proud to say that I didn't experience that when I studied at Deakin. I was able to network with my peers, academics and industry professionals through VCPEP events and experiences, which was very valuable.

What advice would you provide to current scholars in the program?

Remain agile and don't be afraid to jump into an opportunity that may seem a bit left of field. You might love it, or you might hate it; but no experience is a wasted experience. It is just as valuable to know what you don't enjoy as to what you do enjoy. My final piece of advice is to use LinkedIn and use it regularly! Could you please introduce yourself?

My name is Emily and I'm passionate about using highquality evidence to address big problems. I studied a Bachelor of Psychological Science at Deakin and then Honours in Psychology at the University of Melbourne. Now, I work as a Research Officer at BehaviourWorks Australia, the largest applied behaviour change research unit in Australia. I'm also actively involved in Effective Altruism – a community that's dedicated to finding (and actioning) the best ways to help others. Outside of that, I love learning languages and hiking (next year I'll be doing the Pacific Crest Trail, so wish me luck!).

Tell us about your current role. What do you do?

At BehaviourWorks, we work with government and industry to find behavioural solutions to social, environmental, and organisational problems. A client will come to us with an issue – maybe they want to reduce workplace discrimination, or accelerate their organisation's transition to net zero emissions – and we help them to explore the problem and trial solutions. My work involves meeting with clients, designing surveys, conducting literature reviews, facilitating workshops, and disseminating research findings.

In what ways are you leading a bold and exciting career?

So far in my career, I've had the opportunity to influence organisational decisions, state-level policies, and the allocation of millions of dollars of research funding. But, I think the most bold and exciting parts of my career lay ahead. There are so many problems to work on that are big in scale and solvable, but which are currently neglected. From improving animal welfare to helping institutions make better decisions to reducing risks from artificial intelligence – the list can be daunting, but also motivating. The exciting part is figuring out where I can do the most good.

Has there been a pivotal experience in your career to date you would like to share?

A pivotal experience in my career occurred before my career even started. In high school, I read Peter Singer's essay, 'Famine, Affluence, and Morality'. Singer argues that if we can stop something bad from happening, without a major sacrifice, we should do so. This really resonated with me and led me to discover Effective Altruism, which has a huge influence on my career decisions.

How did Deakin and the VCPEP set you up to succeed?

One of the greatest parts of the VCPEP was being connected to my mentor, Nicole Rinehart. An incredible applied academic and clinical psychologist, Nicole helped kickstart my research career (and offered sage advice along the way).

Studying abroad with Deakin was also an important experience. My time in Costa Rica provided me with friendships, memories, and taught me how much I value balancing a focus on impact with my love of adventure.

What advice would you provide to current scholars in the program?

Think big, and then get concrete (in that order). You're in this program, so I know you must be extremely capable. What incredible things do you want to do for the world? How do you want to have an impact? And if that all sounds a bit vague, it usually starts that way. Dedicate some time to making your vision more actionable. One amazing resource for this is 80,000 Hours (80000hours.org) — they have indepth guides on how to pursue a high-impact career. Lastly, remember that taking care of yourself will help you take care of others, and the world.





My next chapter:


My long term goal is to either become a Personal Training Instructor or Physiotherapist for the Australian Defence Force. My next step is starting my Master of Physiotherapy next year.

Could you please introduce yourself?

I'm Phylli. I graduated Deakin University in early 2019. I studied literary studies, criminology and international relations finishing with a Bachelor of Arts, as a Cloud student living in sunny Queensland. The running joke has been that my first day on campus was my graduation. Even then it was after I'd started my graduate program with the Department of Premier and Cabinet (QLD).

Tell us about your current role. What do you do?

I'm a strategist, policy analyst and intelligence professional working in the justice and public safety portfolios of the Queensland Government (for nearly 4 years now). Currently I work for the Department of Queensland Fire and Emergency Services, specialising in developing fiscal strategies and policies. I write our department's budget papers, pitch funding initiatives to Cabinet committees and create products that help decision-makers... make decisions. I'm in a team of 2 that works directly with the Commissioner, Chief Financial Officer, and the Chief Strategy Officer to help keep our department running to respond to emergencies and disasters not only within Queensland but internationally. I also deploy to work in state-level disaster coordination centres during floods, a pandemic, and fires - so I've seen firsthand how administering public funding efficiently and effectively delivers services to everyone in Queensland when they need it – at their most vulnerable.

In what ways are you leading a bold and exciting career?

I never thought of myself as being bold until I read the Queensland Government's response to a particular Commonwealth Government policy proposal that they emphatically didn't support. Under the gold coat of arms were very familiar words. I had written them. I couldn't get my superiors at the time to care about what I hypothesised would result in a future catastrophe. They didn't want to see it and instead suggested I use nicer words to the Commonwealth. I declined. The result was that Cabinet met one Monday morning and sat around a board room discussing the problems with this policy that a 20-something had found, scrutinised, and presented. They got it. Approved. Being bold to me, means being frank and fearless in providing advice. That's something I practice every day with everything that I write, because my words may just determine decisions that effect everybody.

Has there been a pivotal experience in your career to date you would like to share?

In 2021 I was working as a criminal intelligence analyst in Queensland and had been offered a job with the Australian Federal Police in Canberra. I was very excited. I got my clearance and was just about to move when my mother passed away unexpectedly. For the first time I thought about my life as being defined by elements outside of my career — what did I truly care about? What would make me happy? How employers and teams support you/ or don't support you through major changes in your life is so important. I stayed in Queensland (with my amazing team) and that opened different doors and new ways of looking at what I want my life to look like beyond a job title.

How did Deakin and the VCPEP set you up to succeed?

Being a Cloud student has proven an absolute advantage in the last couple of years. I conducted most of my development meetings via Skype and was rocking PJ pants and a nice blouse with pearls long before the pandemic. The team never made me feel like I was missing out and I got to travel to Melbourne to participate in-person which I am very grateful for. VCPEP gave me some accountability regarding my development plan and stretching myself to take opportunities that otherwise I may have put off.

What advice would you provide to current scholars in the program?

Get comfortable with people not immediately understanding your chosen path and how it all connects but learn how to market yourself. I've spent years telling people a story, much like a joke where the disciplines of criminology, international relations and literary studies all walk into a bar together and come out having influenced change in the world. Develop a clear sense of what fascinates you and how all of the skills you are learning will make you the best person for your dream job – then pitch it – and give everyone that "ah-ha" moment.

My next chapter:



Could you please introduce yourself?

Hi – I am Akash JP Punjabi. I graduated from Deakin in 2016 with a Dean's Merit List Award. I have completed three levels of the Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) Program in 2019. Currently, I work as a Senior Consultant at KPMG AU in Brisbane. I am also a Business Collaborator with Four Nations Football Consulting (4NFC) – a Barcelona based boutique football consulting firm. In my spare time, I enjoy mentoring, volunteering, learning tennis, investing and writing sports business articles.

Tell us about your current role. What do you do?

I work in the Management Consulting division of KPMG AU with a focus on Sports related clients. I also do general government advisory as well as work with some private clients. To provide an example — early this year, I worked on a project where we evaluated the funding programs for Sport & Recreation Victoria (SRV) and provided a business case to support the need for further funding. Our work assisted SRV in obtaining \$88m of funding in the 2022-23 VIC State Budget. This would be used to invest in community sports infrastructure which will be amazing for the Victorian community. As we know, sport and recreation have tremendous health benefits for all ages. So, our work helps the government in decision making and eventually benefits our community.

In what ways are you leading a bold and exciting career?

I worked at Deakin in accounting and finance for a couple years and then in audit for KPMG for about three years. So, I started talking to industry professionals, gained insights about the industry and started writing sports business focussed articles.
