You may choose to study a language as a major or minor within your degree, or add on a specialist language diploma alongside your undergraduate studies.


You don't have to have any prior knowledge to study a language at Deakin (if you do have prior knowledge, we can accommodate that too).

Disciplines

Take a look through our disciplines to choose your area of expertise. Knowing which discipline you're interested in helps career practitioners find the best course for you. Corresponding courses are featured on the following pages, so you can learn more about what you'll study, available professional work experience opportunities and the types of careers you could pursue. Anthropology

Anthropology is the study of humanity in the broadest sense. Anthropology at Deakin focuses on the ways human society creates its communities in diverse cultural settings. Studies in anthropology prepare you to understand and work with people in diverse and international settings. Topics studied include poverty and development, crime and violence, belief systems, health and illness and human ecology.

You may find employment in community relations, the education sector, government departments, the health industry, media corporations, research consultancies and welfare organisations.

Arabic

Australia's trade with the Middle East has more than doubled in the past decade, making it an increasingly important region with broad strategic, economic, religious and cultural influence. Studies in Arabic help you develop communication skills in modern standard Arabic, with language fluency further enhanced through an understanding of Middle Eastern history, culture and society. In-country language programs are available to students undertaking a major sequence in Arabic.

Chinese

Mandarin Chinese is one of the world's most important languages. It is the official language of the People's Republic of China, Taiwan and Singapore and is one of the five official languages of the United Nations. Develop your communication skills in Chinese, with language fluency further enhanced through an understanding of Chinese culture, history and society. In-country language programs are available to students undertaking a major sequence in Chinese, giving you the opportunity to travel overseas and try out your language skills with native speakers.

Criminology

Gain a theoretical and practical understanding of the causes of crime and key problems associated with law enforcement, court processes and punishment. Criminology examines how societies deal with a wide range of crime issues of contemporary significance, including violence in the home, environmental crime, technology and crime, victimisation, and surveillance processes. The overall objective of a criminology degree is to develop your understanding and critical interpretation of a wide range of knowledge related to crime, and to develop skills for undertaking criminological research and respond effectively to the challenges of crime.

Education

Gain a strong understanding of education across a broad range of contexts. Learn about educating children, young people and adults by exploring topics like the sociology, politics and policy of education; the history and philosophy of education; and how psychology is applied to the work of educators to better understand how people learn and become motivated, and how we teach each other about inclusivity and diversity.

English - Children's literature

Deakin is a world leader in the study of literature for children and young adults. Discover key trends in children's texts across a range of media, and how stories for young people reflect and challenge the values of their time. This discipline caters to anyone interested in children's literature as a prominent domain of literary production, to those intending to work with children and young people as primary or secondary teachers and librarians, and to those who wish to produce texts for young people.

Disciplines

English - Creative writing

Gain expertise, practical experience and develop skills in creative writing. With an emphasis on publication or the achievement of professional standards, you'll undertake various forms of constructive, descriptive and narrative writing, progressing to editing, non-fiction and fiction writing, script writing, poetry writing, and digital forms of writing.

English - Literature

At Deakin, literature is the door to new understandings of cultures and histories. Our literary studies scholars have international profiles in philosophy, poetry, ecology and Australian literature, and will guide you in critical and creative journeys through great literature from the medieval era to today. There are also many opportunities for your own creative writing and critical analysis.

Film and television studies

Develop your creative ideas, practical skills and screen culture knowledge. This discipline will immerse you in various storytelling techniques, histories, developments and contexts that enable the creation of screen productions in Australia and around the world. As you delve into the exhibition of screen works, you'll explore the different ways audiences engage with film and television locally and globally.

Gender and sexuality studies

Through an integrated study of local experiences and transnational flows of knowledge and influences, you'll gain insight into the key forces which shape our understandings and lived experiences of gender and sexuality, both as cultural phenomena and as embodied practices. In particular, the program emphasises the intersectional dimensions of gender and sexuality, addressing questions of class, citizenship, ethnicity, race, religion, ability and geographical location.

History

You have the opportunity to explore the nature of the modern world – the forces that have shaped our past and present, and the ways historians interpret historical events. Themes covered include the world in the 20th century, war and peace, modernisation and social change, colonialism, and gender.

You may find employment opportunities in the education sector, local government, media corporations, museums/heritage organisations, research consultancies and tourism organisations.

Disciplines

Indonesian

As the world's fourth most populous nation and a close neighbouring country, Indonesia is vitally important to Australia. By studying Indonesian language, you'll gain a range of communication skills and an understanding of Indonesian history, culture and society. Exciting opportunities for international placements enrich this learning and enhance employability.

Indonesian language skills and experience in diverse cultural settings are valued attributes. Career opportunities in Federal and State Government departments include DFAT, AusAID, intelligence agencies and the education sector.

International relations

Gain an in-depth understanding of global political systems and relationships. Why do states co-operate with each other? Why do they make war? How can we define power and security? What role does globalisation play in state interactions and how does the international system deal with issues such as human rights, humanitarian and environmental challenges?

Media and communication

Gain a solid footing in the key developments of the broad communications industries that are re-shaping our cultures. Sitting at the intersections of a range of communication disciplines, you will be able to develop the skills to ask – and answer – the big contemporary questions and debates around big data and surveillance, the state of the news media and the rise of celebrity culture. Use these insights to make a meaningful contribution to the local and global communication industries and wider community.

Media studies

This is an area of rapid and continuous technological, political, economic and social change. Much of the recent explosion in the stock of human knowledge is linked with developments in media. Studying this discipline will equip you with a unique multiskilled qualification appropriate for many careers and job markets.

Performing arts

Immerse yourself in the exciting physical, social and conceptual possibilities of performing arts. Learn how performance and embodied creativity intersects with innovative thinking, community enrichment and technology. Study the diverse ways in which performing arts can engage and make a difference.

Philosophy

Philosophy at Deakin asks questions about the nature of reality, truth, knowledge, meaning, the mind, personal identity, the good in ethical and political life, and the value and power of art. At the same time, it fosters the development of skills in critical and creative thinking, argumentation, communication, problem-solving and research.

Politics and policy studies

Enhance your understanding of the big issues in the world today and develop the skills to make a difference in your lifetime. You'll investigate the challenge posed to Australia and the world by climate change, asylum seekers and refugees, development, inequality, political parties and new social movements. Examine the ideas behind the policy and the rhetoric – then look globally for different solutions, investigate how policy lessons are learned, and assess the impact on domestic and global politics.

Public relations studies

Public relations practitioners are 21st-century communication specialists who manage and coordinate relationships between organisations, agencies and the public. With a focus on ethical and sustainable communication practices, this discipline builds key knowledge and skills in core public relations responsibilities such as event management and campaigns, social media tactics and media relations, and strategic planning, management and communication.

Religious studies

Understanding religion has seldom been as important as it is today. There is increasing dialogue among the greater religions of the world, but there is also increasing misunderstandings of religious traditions. Religious studies at Deakin explores religions from diverse viewpoints and methodologies, including perspectives from the disciplines of anthropology, philosophy, sociology and Indigenous studies.

Social media

Working across a range of social media platforms, you will specialise in digital content creation to engage audiences and build communities. You will combine production skills with various online storytelling forms, applying knowledge of the ethical guardrails and legal constraints that come with producing content for present day industries.

Sociology

Sociology is the academic study of society. Explore social change and how social structures, social institutions and culture shape the lives of individuals and communities. Engage with contemporary issues in the global and Australian landscape such as how society shapes (and is shaped by) illness and health policies, gender and sexuality, religion and new forms of spirituality, migration and inequality, violence and social control.

Spanish

Spanish is a thriving international language, with close to 543 million Spanish native speakers. Deakin's Spanish studies will help you develop a wide range of communication skills in Spanish, regardless of whether you have any previous experience in the language. Our sequential proficiency levels will take you from scratch to fluency or near fluency.

Sport journalism

Transform your passion into a career as a sport reporter. Deakin's sport journalism major takes you beyond the game to the broader business, and legal and ethical issues associated with sports. You'll combine practical journalistic and production skills across all news media platforms. Learn from teachers who are leaders and practitioners in their fields, while developing your professional network and portfolio.



- one major sequence of at least 8 credit points plus one minor sequence of at least 4 credit points.

Remaining credit points may be used to undertake an additional minor sequence or elective units.



Associate Degree of Arts¹









University can be a challenge, which is why we've designed a course that offers you a supported learning environment and a guaranteed pathway into Deakin's Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Criminology or Bachelor of International Studies. The Associate Degree of Arts teaches you the learning skills you need to be successful at university, including communication, digital literacy, critical thinking and teamwork skills.

From day one you will be a part of the Deakin community and campus atmosphere. From your first trimester, you will also complete units from your target degree (depending on which stream you choose) to ensure you are ready to transition into your bachelor degree.

Careers

Upon graduation from the Associate Degree of Arts, you'll have the opportunity to continue studying or use the degree as a standalone qualification. You'll have guaranteed entry into our Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Criminology or Bachelor of International Studies, depending on which stream you choose, plus receive credit that could put you straight into your second year.2

You'll also have the opportunity to apply to transition into other bachelor degrees, including communication, design, psychology, health science, nursing, commerce, management or science.

An associate degree equips you with the skills to succeed at university, and in your career.

This 16-credit-point course consists of 4 credit points of foundation units and 12 credit points of the General stream, Criminology stream or International Studies stream units. You must also complete the Academic Integrity Module (0 credit points).
